Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002

Request

Please find below our response to your correspondence dated 22 March, in which you made the following request under the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

Many people are concerned about a new type of pathology that has appeared which undertakers have found in the newly deceased. This is widely discussed but particularly well covered by Dr John Campbell on his videos.

Should you wish to appeal against the Commissioner's decision, you can appeal to the Court of Session, only if you think the law has not been applied correctly.
