1.1	<p>This paper provides the Scottish Police Authority (SPA) with a weekly update on policing changes seen during Operation TALLA, Police Scotland’s COVID-19 response.</p> <p>This report contains the preceding week’s information and data on changing demands within the service centre, incident attendance and crime. It will also consider our COVID-19 response including our use of the emergency legislation and how we are assisting our officers and staff welfare throughout these challenging times.</p> <p>This update will have a reporting period of Thursday to Wednesday. For the purpose of this report, the week of Thursday 11 March to Wednesday 17 March 2021 is considered.</p>

4.1	<p>This report aligns to both Police Scotland’s Strategic Outcomes and the Operation TALLA Strategic Objectives as set out by DCC Malcolm Graham.</p> <p>This report discusses the flexible and adaptable response to the challenges posed by COVID-19 by Police Scotland (SO1, SO2 and SO5). It further highlights the activities undertaken by Police Scotland to protect our people (SO4). The levels of intervention activity discussed in the report serve to protect our communities from COVID-19 (SO1, SO2). The frequent, transparent publication of papers, such as this, and those published on the Police Scotland website provide engagement with communities, to maintain trust and confidence (SO3).</p>

5.1 CURRENT LANDSCAPE

Scotland continues to operate under the level or tiered system approach, which includes enforceable travel regulations for those local authorities subject to level 3 and 4 restrictions. All of mainland Scotland remains under lockdown.

On 11 March 2021 the First Minister announced that 1,825,800 people have received their first dose of the vaccine and 141,433 have had their second dose.

On 16 March 2021 the First Minister made the following announcements:

- The stay at home rule expected to be lifted on 2 April, to be replaced with stay local guidance – not to travel outside your own local authority area unless for an essential purpose.
- On 5 April contact sports expected to be allowed for 12 to 17 year olds.
- From 5 April more students will be able to return to on campus learning.
- From 5 April, phased re-opening of non-essential retail, with click and collect being allowed from this date.
- From this date Garden centres will be able to reopen and hairdressers will be allowed to reopen for appointments.
- From 26 April it is expected that all parts of Scotland currently in level 4 will moved to a modified level 3 and Island communities will have the option to move to level 2.
- From this date it is expected that restrictions on journeys within mainland Scotland will be lifted entirely, and journeys between Scotland and other parts of the UK and the wider common travel area can also be lifted, if not on 26 April, then as soon as possible thereafter.
- Also on 26 April all remaining retail premises expected to reopen, all tourist accommodation will be able to reopen subject to remaining restrictions on hospitality.
- Also expected to be able to open on this date are libraries, museums, galleries and indoor gyms.
- The limit on attendance at weddings, funerals and associated receptions expected to be raised to 50 from this date.
- Six people from 3 different households will be able to meet outdoors.
- Also cafes, restaurants and bars will be able to serve people outdoors, in groups of up to 6 from 3 households until 10pm. Alcohol will be permitted with no requirement for food to be served.
- People on the shielding list can return to work on this date.
- From the 17 May it is hoped that all level 3 areas will move to level 2.
- From this date adult outdoor contact sports and indoor group exercises can resume.

On 17 March 2021 the First Minister announced that 1,918,818 people have had received their first dose of the vaccine and 181,879 have received their second dose. This is an increase of 93,018 and 40,446 respectively during this review period.

Coronavirus is still having an impact on absence levels across the organisation; however, they continue to be internally managed by each local policing division. Absence levels and trends are still monitored closely in order to mitigate risk and address any emerging resourcing demands in early course. Police Scotland's Outbreak Management Team (OMT) remains in

place, providing an internal 'track and trace' function and advice to police officers and staff, as well as engaging with divisions to assist in limiting any spread of coronavirus throughout the organisation. Learning opportunities from previous outbreaks are being identified and collated by the team and these will be communicated across all divisions and departments.

Whilst increased restrictions are in place, including travel restrictions between local authority areas, Police Scotland's approach remains unchanged and continues to promote 'Engage, Explain and Encourage' methods prior to 'Enforcement' action being taken against apparent breaches of legislation. It remains the position that officers may move more quickly through the 4E process if they perceive that persons are engaging in a blatant, conscious and inexcusable breach of regulations, involving repeat locations or individuals and whether an absence of enforcement would damage public confidence in policing.

5.2 SERVICE CENTRE DEMAND

This week, the volume of 101 calls answered has decreased by **2%** comparable to last week's figure and the volume of 999 calls is comparable to last weeks. The number of 101 calls and 999 calls answered this year are both lower than the same week last year, **(-2%)** and **(-9%)** respectively.

5.3 INCIDENT DEMAND

Total incident volume has decreased by **1%** from last week's figure and has reduced by **1%** when compared to the same dates in 2020.

In comparison to the same period last year, Public Nuisance incidents have increased by **197%**, while noise incidents have increased by **2%**. Disturbance incidents have decreased by **13%**. In comparison to last week, public nuisance incidents and noise incidents have decreased by 12% and 10% respectively, whilst disturbance incidents have increased by **1%**.

5.4 CRIME

Overall crime in the last week is at a lower level than a comparable period last year, and it was also lower than a comparable week pre-lockdown. Most divisions (with the exception of North East Scotland and Fife) have noted a decrease in crime volumes this week when compared to the same period over the previous two years. Tayside has seen a decrease from 2020/21 but an increase from 2019/20. Highland & Islands is comparable with 2020/21 but lower than 2019/20.

The collective volume of recorded crimes for most crime groups is lower when compared to the previous 2 years, with only Group 5 crimes being higher than both the previous two years figures. Most divisions (excluding North East Scotland and Fife) continue to show a cumulative decrease in volume when compared to the same period over the last two years. Tayside shows a decrease in volume from 2020/21 and an increase from 2019/20. Highland and Islands shows a comparable volume with 2020/21 and a decrease from 2019/20

5.5 COVID-19 INTERVENTION ACTIVITY

As stated above, Police Scotland's approach to the use of COVID-19 legislation remains to firstly engage with people, explain the provisions and encourage them to comply with the necessary restrictions, with enforcement action being taken where there are found to be flagrant and blatant breaches of legislation.

Incidents requiring COVID-19 interventions by officers have decreased from **342** last week to **240** this week (**-30%**). The total number of persons involved in these interventions has increased from **2617** last week to **2342** this week, a decrease of **11%**. **1654 (71%)** of the **2342** interventions this week took place in a private dwelling. This is an increase on the previous week's **59%**. Figures for this week are accurate as at 18 March 2021.

Since quarantine regulations came into force on travellers entering Scotland from out with the UK on the 15 June 2020, up to and including 17 March 2021, Police Scotland have received **4209** referrals from Public Health Scotland (PHS) relating to potential breaches of quarantine. **790** of these were dealt with by the resolution team and **711** have been dealt with by local policing. **2703** referrals were weeded prior to an incident being raised. In respect of resolved referrals, **80%** of the foreign travellers were found to be complying with quarantine restrictions. In the majority of the remaining referrals, the travellers have been untraced due to a variety of reasons such as inaccurate data provided to PHS or the expiration of the quarantine period prior to persons being traced.

There have been **17** occasions where enforcement has been used in relation to breaches of quarantine regulations generated from Home Office or Public Health Scotland referrals and one report to the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service (COPFS).

5.6 ABSENCE

General employee absence levels have remained fairly consistent over the last week. Divisions and departments are currently coping locally with outbreaks and contact/tracing requirements; however, this is being monitored carefully. Absences related specifically to COVID-19 have decreased, with **285** people absent, as of 17 March 2021, down from **311** last week.

5.7 OUTBREAK MANAGEMENT TEAM

Police Scotland's Outbreak Management Team (OMT) respond to and investigate positive cases amongst officers and staff and work in conjunction with the national NHS Test & Protect network to arrive at proportionate, balanced decisions on the identification of individuals at risk after close contact with a positive case and any requirement for self-isolation. This, following consideration of all operational circumstances, the use of PPE and other safety measures, has enabled the safe retention of officers and staff in the workplace and the self-isolation of those agreed to be at heightened risk. The team's work will continue to capture information and the circumstances in respect of specific outbreaks in order that procedures can be reviewed and additional safety measures cascaded and implemented as required.

From inception until 3 March 2021, the OMT has reviewed **848** cases and, from these, **1288** individuals have tested positive for COVID-19. The work of the OMT has led them to trace **1322** individuals who have required to isolate, whilst the NHS has traced **245** individuals. On average, each case leads to **3.5** absences. The work of the OMT has also led to the identification of **130** individuals who had initially been required to self-isolate and were able to return to work.

5.8 COVID-19 NEAR MISSES

'Near miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons e.g. when officers are potentially exposed to COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19. This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE.

The most current 'near miss' figures available for the dates 9 March until 15 March 2021 confirm that **19** forms were submitted. This is a decrease of **44%** from the **34** forms last week.

5.9 GATHERINGS IN PRIVATE DWELLINGS

Scottish Government commissioned data suggests that spread in and between households continues to drive much of the transmission of COVID-19. This analysis has guided the decision to introduce national measures to prevent persons visiting other households in higher risk areas.

Police Scotland have undertaken an assessment of the demand posed by dwelling house gatherings. It should be noted that the methodology of counting of house gatherings is designed to quantify the number of times officers have had to enter a private dwelling or private garden to investigate suspected breach of legislation or guidance, due to the increased risks of COVID transmission associated with these environments; therefore, if officers do not physically attend, or indeed gain entry to the dwelling or garden, this will not be included as a house gathering as there is no evidence there has been one and no increased risk to officers. Information gathered is indicative and should not be considered official police statistics.

Indicative figures from the week of 11 March until 17 March 2021, suggest that Police Scotland attended **412** occurrences of house gatherings throughout the force area, a decrease of **45** from last week (**-10%**). Enforcement levels for FPN have increased from **492** last week to **501** this week (**+2%**) and arrests have decreased from **23** to **22** over the same period.

Notable incidents over the past week include:

Lanarkshire

(13/03/21) - Report of house party full of students. Householder was not present. 19 FPNs issued and gathering dispersed.

Edinburgh City

(13/03/21) - Report of house party. On police attendance, 30 persons found within. 2 occupants issued FPNs and 28 persons dispersed.

(12/03/21) - Report of party. Officers attended and found large gathering of students. 34 FPNs issued. Occupier charged with Culpable & Reckless Conduct.

(13/03/21) – Report of student party. Police attended and 15 FPNs issued. All dispersed.

(13/03/21) – Report of party at Student accommodation. Police attended and found 32 persons within. 4E's applied. All warned and dispersed.

Fife

(12/03/21) - Report of loud party at locus. 20 persons within inflatable pub in back garden. Householder charged for Culpable & Reckless conduct. Gathering dispersed.

(13/03/21) - Student party overheard by officers on foot patrol. Entry permitted and 12 FPNs issued. 10 persons dispersed.

(15/03/21) - Report of students having a party. 7 persons found within, 5 of which were issued FPNs. 2 householders charged with Culpable & Reckless Conduct.

Greater Glasgow

(13/03/21) - Report of party in rear garden. 20 persons present. 2 householders became obstructive as officers were noting details. Householders charged with Culpable & Reckless Conduct and obstruction. 3 FPNs issued and gathering dispersed.

Renfrewshire and Inverclyde

(14/03/21) - Several calls received from nearby residents of party at locus. On arrival, the householder and 3 non-resident family members were located within. The 3 non-residents quickly became hostile and were arrested for Breach of the Peace. FPN issued to householder.

The Lothians & Scottish Borders

(11/03/21) - Repeat offender having been reported for having persons from different households within his home address. Male arrested for Culpable & Reckless Conduct. Held in custody to appear at Edinburgh Sheriff Court.

(12/03/21) - Householder arrested with Culpable & Reckless Conduct due to 3 other persons within household. (4 previous FPNs and previously charge for Culpable & Reckless Conduct). Released on Undertaking. On 14/03/21, another report of numerous persons within. 7 persons found within. Householder arrested for Breach of Bail and held in custody to appear at Edinburgh Sheriff Court on 15/03/21. 4 FPNs issued to other persons.

Tayside

(12/03/21) - Report of visitors at house and loud music, with persons on the roof throwing items at parked cars. Police attended and 4 persons on roof returned to flat. 5 youths within dispersed and occupier charged with Culpable & Reckless Conduct. 1 person arrested on warrant.

(12/03/21) – Report of ongoing party. Police attended and 5 persons found within. 3 FPNs issued and 2 householders charged with Culpable & Reckless Conduct. Male householder later arrested same evening for confronting person reporting after police left the scene.

(14/03/21) - Report of ongoing party at student accommodation. About 50 persons present. 2 FPNs issued to hosts and gathering dispersed.

5.10 TRAVEL REGULATIONS

At 1800 hours on Friday 20 November 2020, legislative travel restrictions were introduced across local authorities subject to levels 3 and 4 restrictions. The following data comprises travel regulations interventions from 11 March until 17 March 2021 inclusive.

Police Scotland has carried out **101** interventions and issued **30** FPN in respect of travel regulations within the time frame, compared to the **208** interventions and **79** FPN recorded last week.

Notable incidents during this period include:

Greater Glasgow

(11/03/21) - 2 females observed vandalising building at locus with marker pens. Both issued with Recorded Police Warnings. Both females aged 18 and 19, one being from Paisley and the other from nearby student accommodation, who could provide no reasonable explanation for being at the locus at that time of night. Both also issued FPNs.

Lothians & Scottish Borders

(13/03/21) – Male traced within derelict building of Wellington Farm School, Penicuik in the company of step-son and step-son's partner, exploring and taking photographs. He admitted that it had been his idea and he had drove them to the site after seeing it mentioned online. FPN issued.

Argyll & West Dunbartonshire Division

(12/03/21) - Report of son visiting mother in Dunoon in breach of regulations. Police attended and located male and ascertained that he resides in Surrey. FPN issued and he will be returning home.

Renfrewshire & Inverclyde

(13/03/21) – Officers had reason to stop suspect's car when it was ascertained he had driven up from Preston to visit his girlfriend, who was also in the car. Both issued FPNs and advised to return home.

Highlands and Islands

(14/03/21) – 2 males completing charity fundraising walk from John O'Groats to Lands' End. Previously asked to return back home to England. 2 FPNs issued.

Edinburgh

(13/03/21) – Police attended a report of a suspicious vehicle. On speaking to owner of vehicle it was ascertained that he had driven to Edinburgh with his girlfriend. He stated they had travelled from London to Glasgow for a job interview before travelling to Edinburgh, where they rented an Airbnb. Neither could provide anything to back up their claims of a job interview and at one point claimed that it was a friend they were visiting to see if they could gain

employment. The vehicle was also found to have no insurance and both were subject to S23 MDA search and Cannabis was found. Both were charged with Culpable & Reckless Conduct, in respect of the COVID Breach.

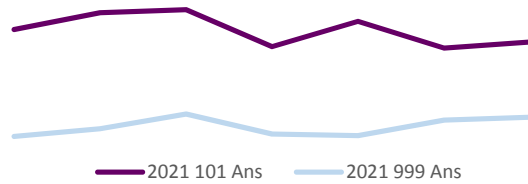

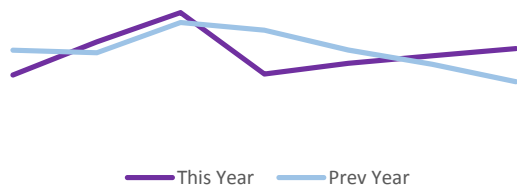
Service Centre Demand

From 28/08/2020 – 17/03/2021

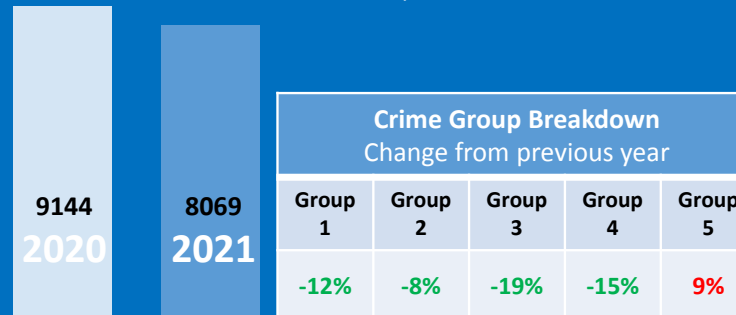

Crime Volume (9 March – Present compared to Previous Year)

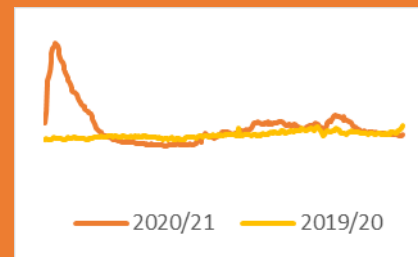
Crime has continued to trend at levels lower than the seasonal average, and total crime volume year to date continues to remain lower (12%) than last year.

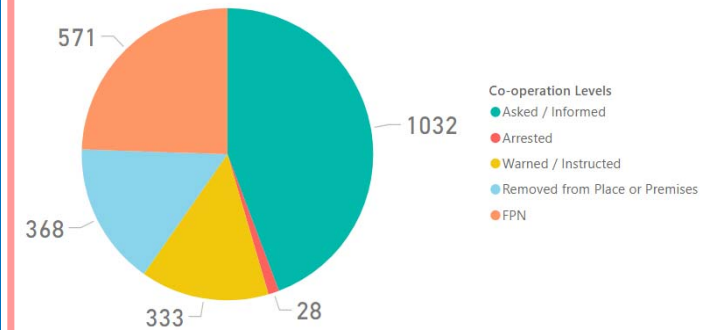


Absences throughout the week have remained relatively static however trend below levels when compared to 2020. Absences remain significantly below the peak in April 2020.

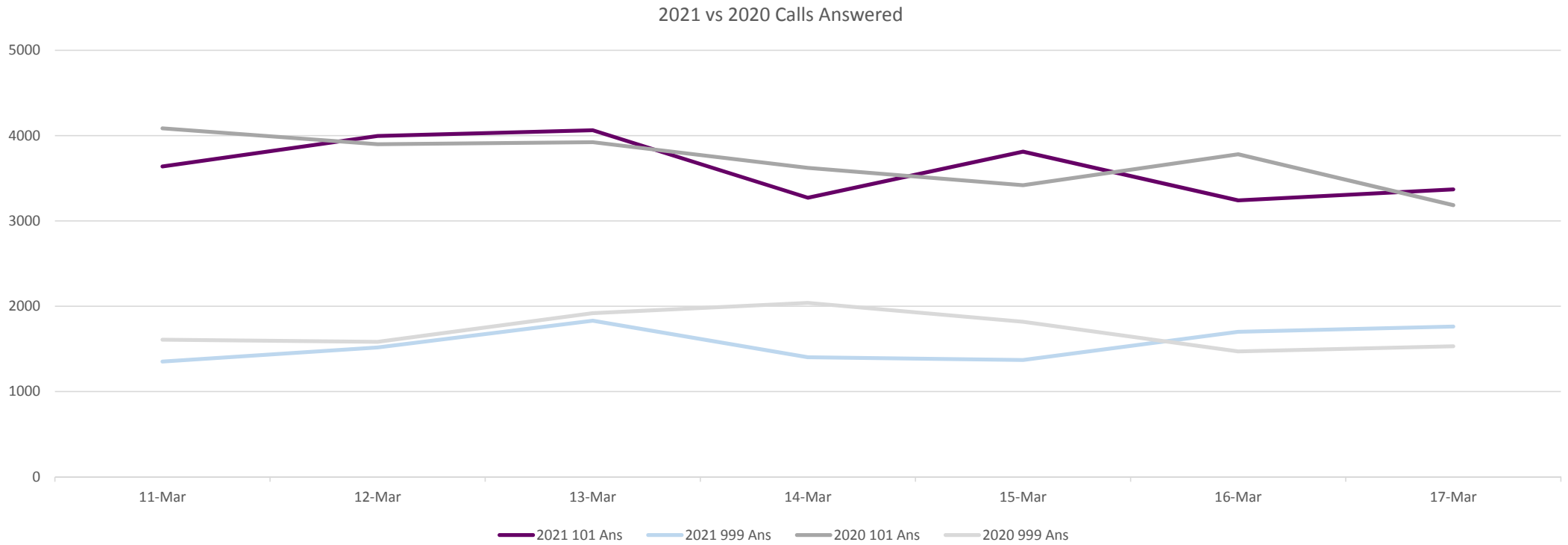

Weekly Service Centre Demand (11th March – 17th March 2021)



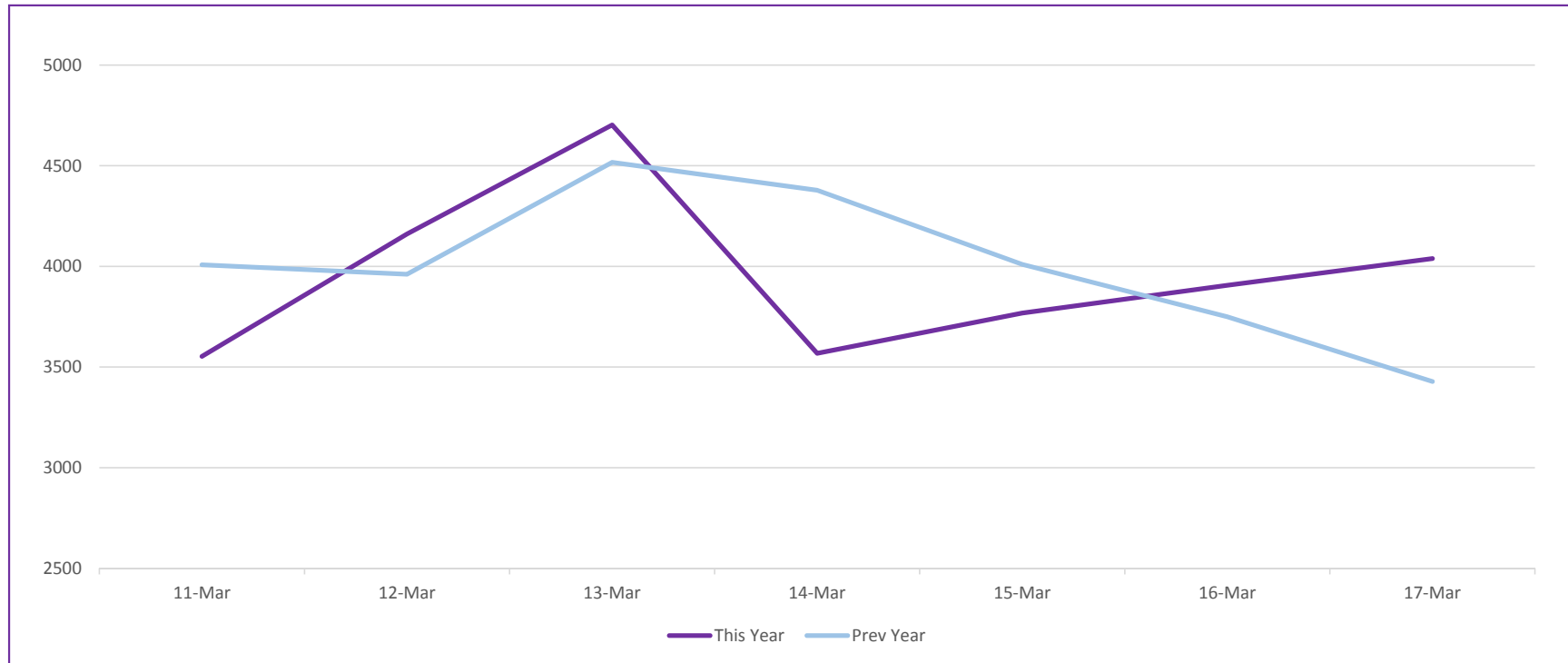

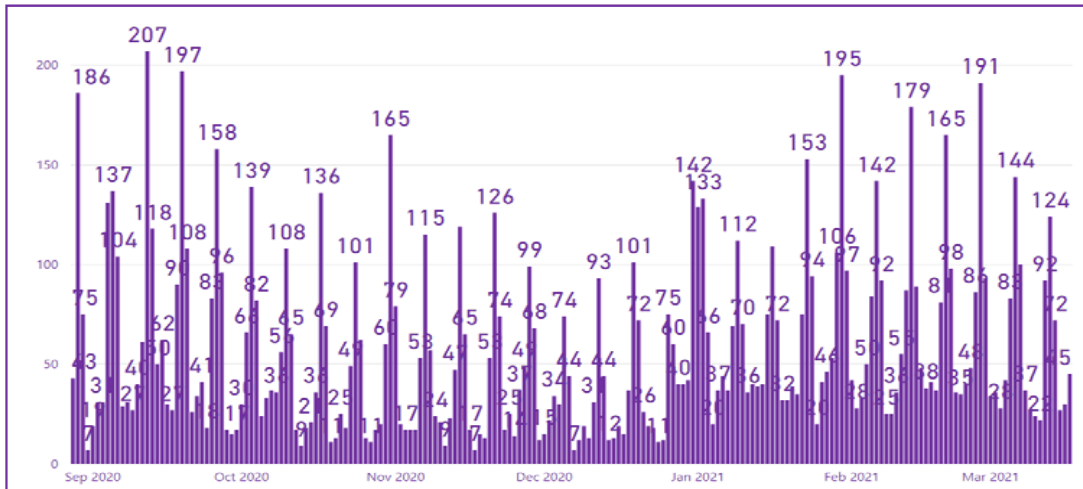

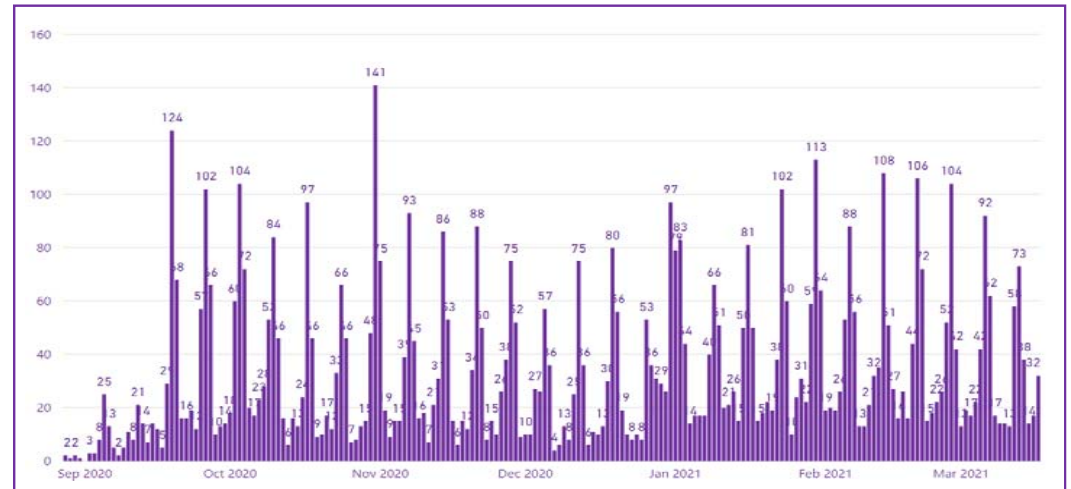
Incident Demand – House Gatherings (28th August 2020 – 17th March 2021)

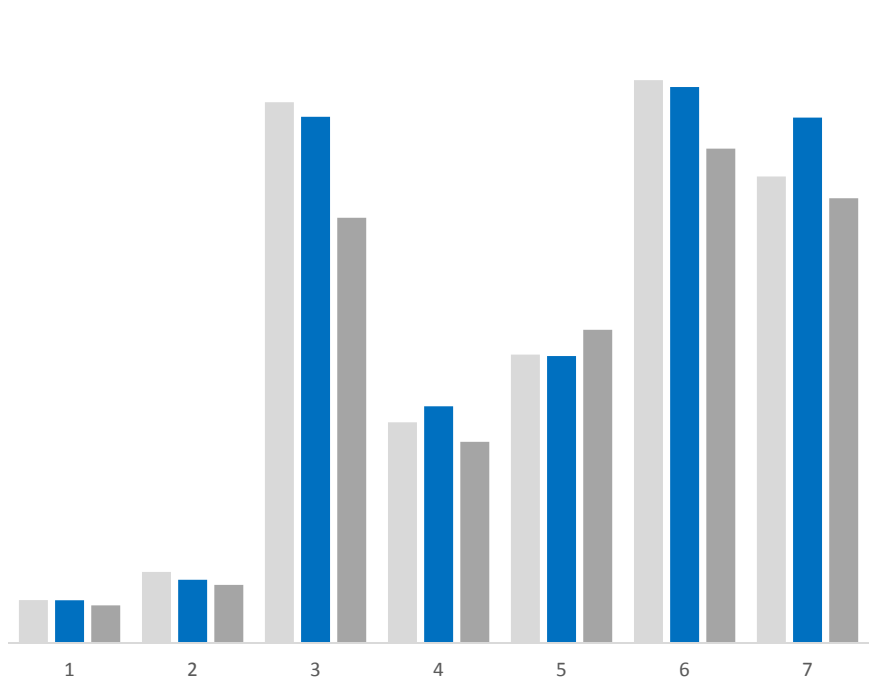

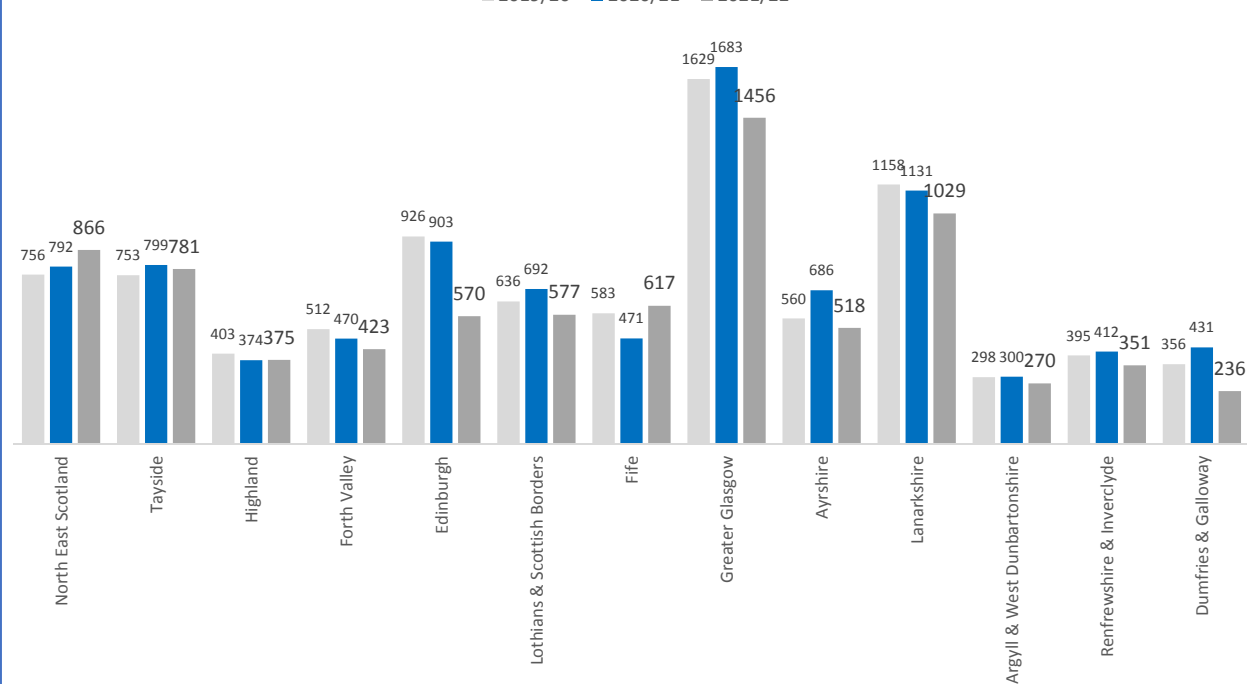

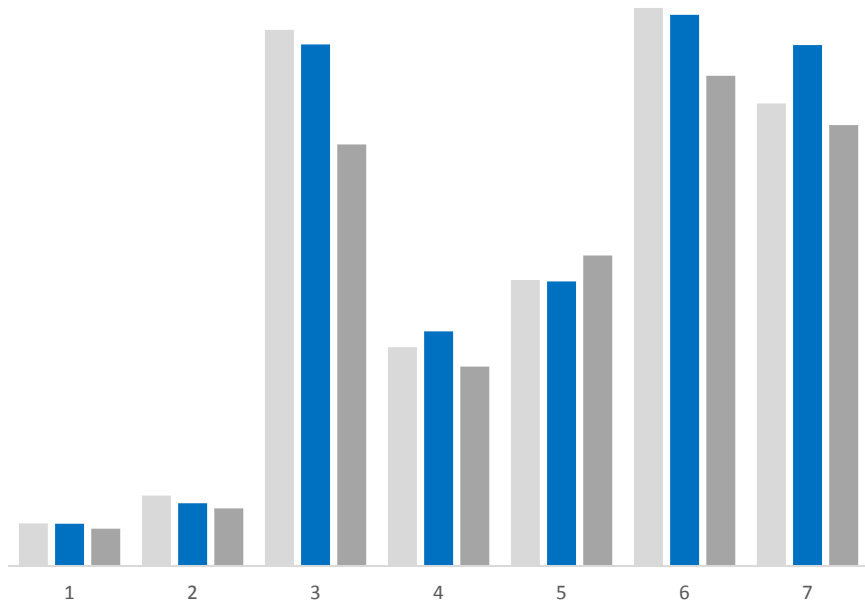

Cumulative Crime Demand (16th March 2020 – 14th March 2021)

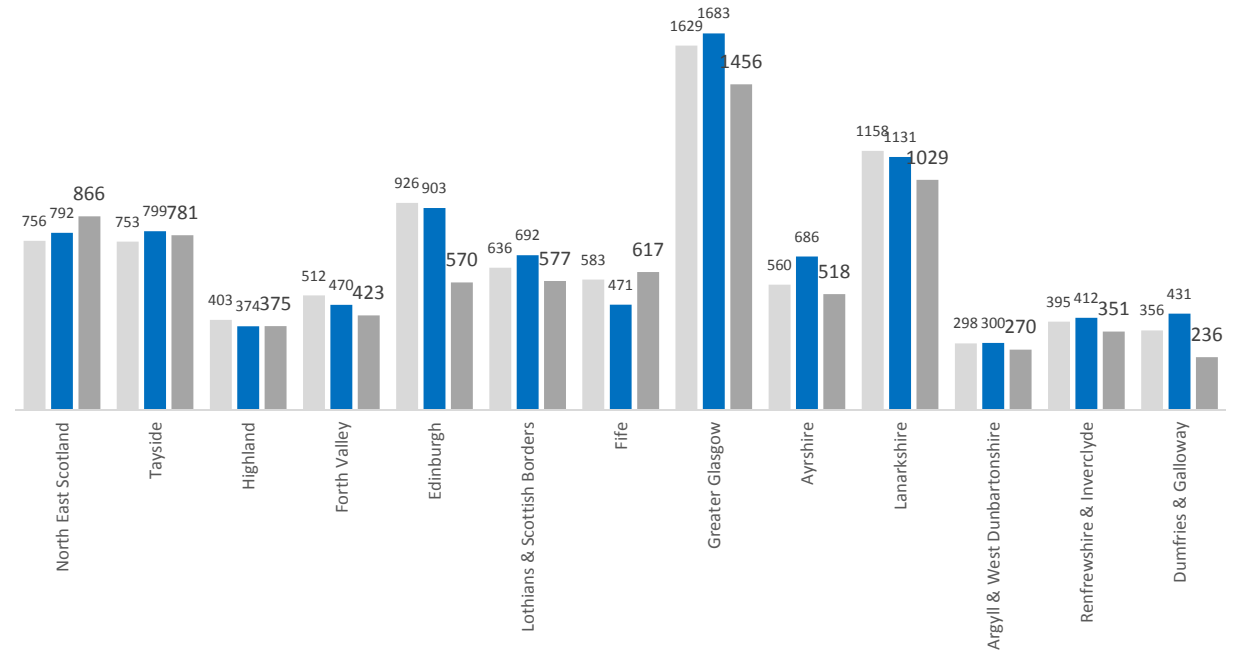
Total Crime by Group

In order to report upon policing interventions in respect of the newly introduced Travel Regulations regarding travel to or from tiers 3 and 4, the CVI system has been updated. The above data is a sub-set of the wider CVI interventions reported on the previous slides and should not be considered as 'in addition to' the previous overall CVI activity slides.

In response to the introduction of The Health Protection (Coronavirus) (Restrictions) (Scotland) Regulations 2020 and Coronavirus Act 2020, Police Scotland developed a 'Coronavirus Interventions' (CVI) recording system. This system allowed Police Scotland to begin gathering data in relation to the public co-operation levels with the new legislation. This system relies on Police Officers manually updating the system with the co-operation level when they encounter an individual in contravention of the new legislation.

Due to the manual input required to form this data set, the contents of this slide are indicative only. Actual figures will differ from those recorded on Crime Systems (please see slide 11), may be subject to change, and cannot be considered Official Police Statistics. They do provide an indication of the public co-operation levels across Scotland.

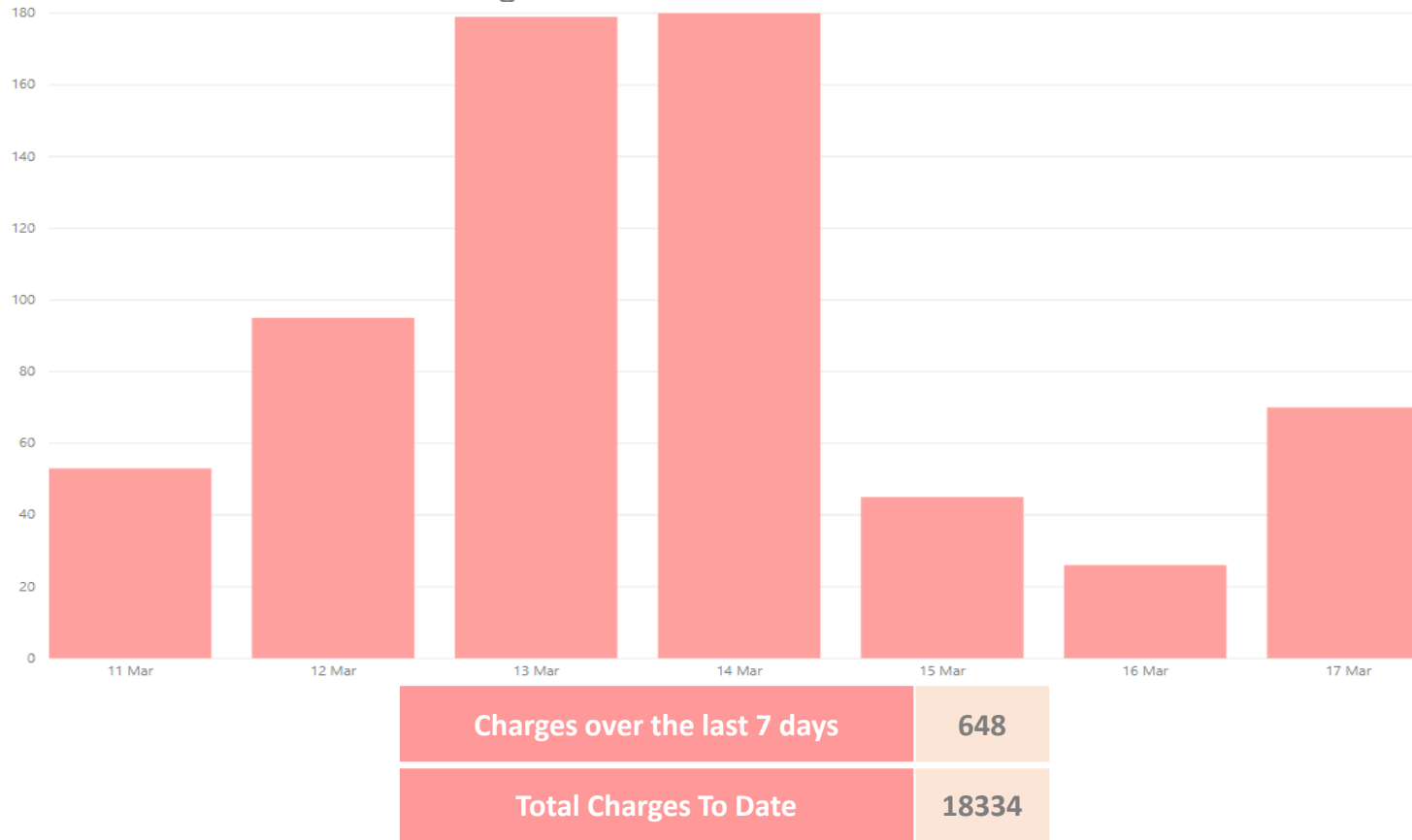

'Enforcement' of Coronavirus specific legislation

The following is a summary of all 'enforcement' action in relation to both The Health Protection (Coronavirus) (Restrictions) (Scotland) Regulations 2020 and Coronavirus Act 2020. This includes all Fixed Penalty Notices issued and processed by Police Scotland. It also includes all occasions that a charge was libelled and recorded on Police Scotland's Crime Recording System against a person in relation to the aforementioned legislation. This is a true value of the volume of recorded 'enforcement' activity, but does not provide the granularity of the Coronavirus Intervention (CVI) recording system and does not capture the earlier phases of the '4 E's' approach. These values remain subject to change as offences are retrospectively added or amended and do not match the indicative 'enforcement' values from the CVI recording system.

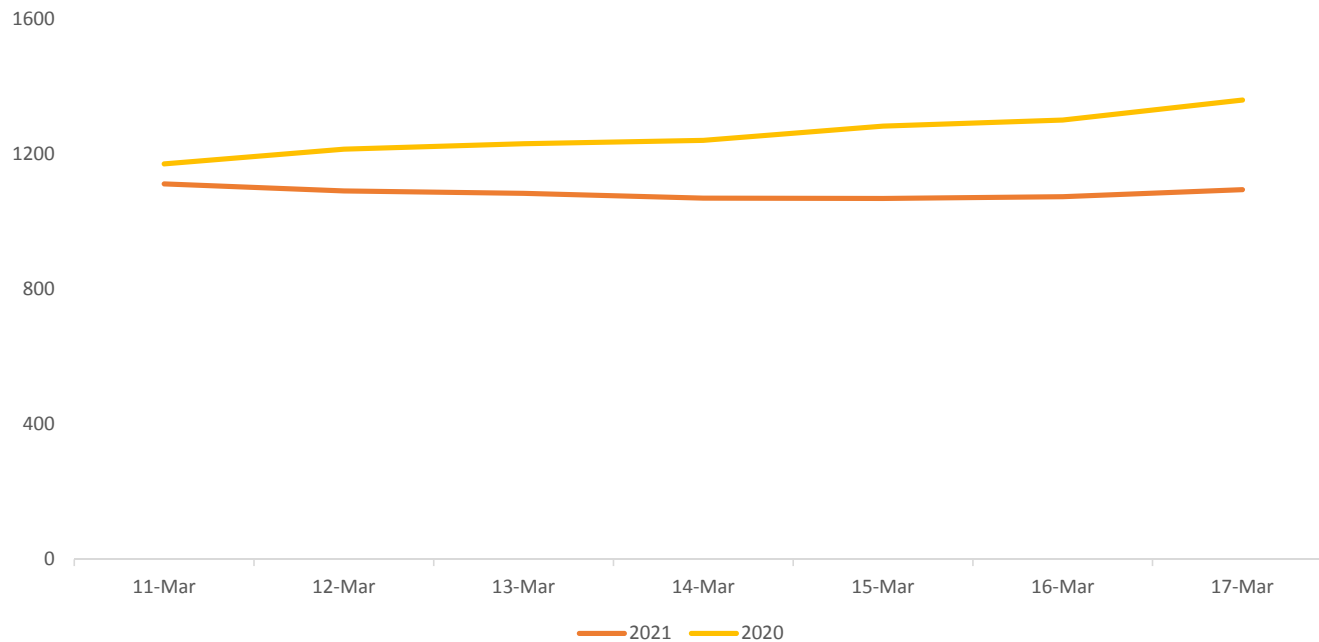

Weekly Absence Levels Line Graph – Comparison of last year to this year



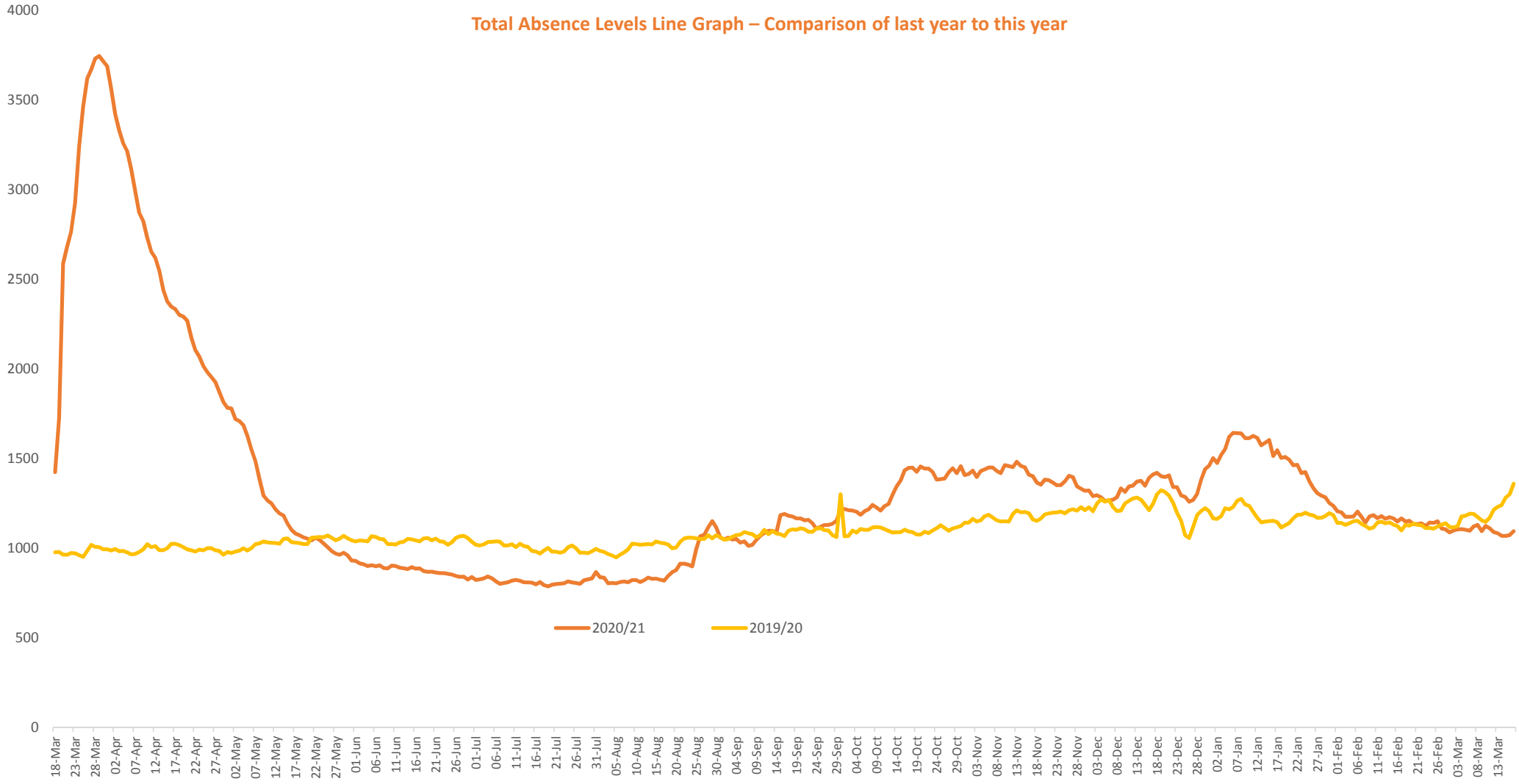

Total Absence Levels Line Graph – Comparison of last year to this year

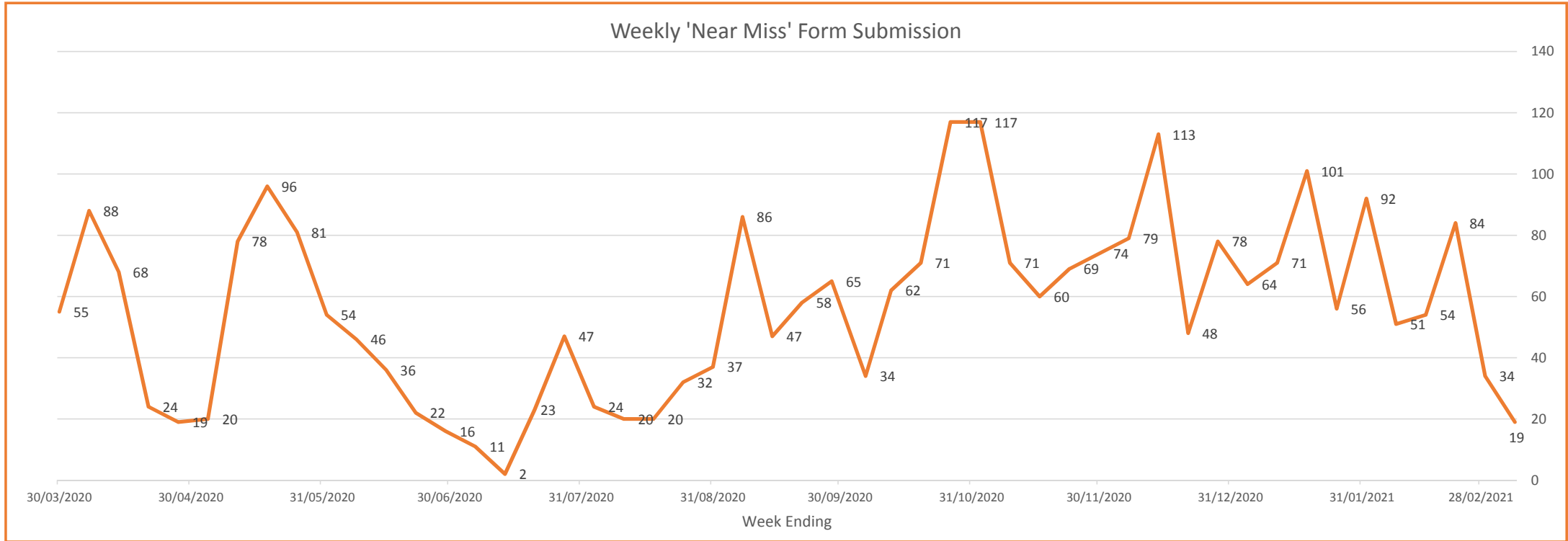

Near Miss and Testing Data (w/e 23rd March – 15th March 2021)



'Near miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons. i.e. when officers are potentially exposed to: COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19.

This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE. This number of 'Near Miss' weekly submissions is up slightly from last week.

The amount of forms submitted continues to be attributable to the process for requesting an asymptomatic COVID-19 screening test due to an occupational risk, requiring the submission of a 'near miss' form. Many of the reports would not have been submitted without this requirement. The number of incidents where a lack of PPE is identified has not risen.

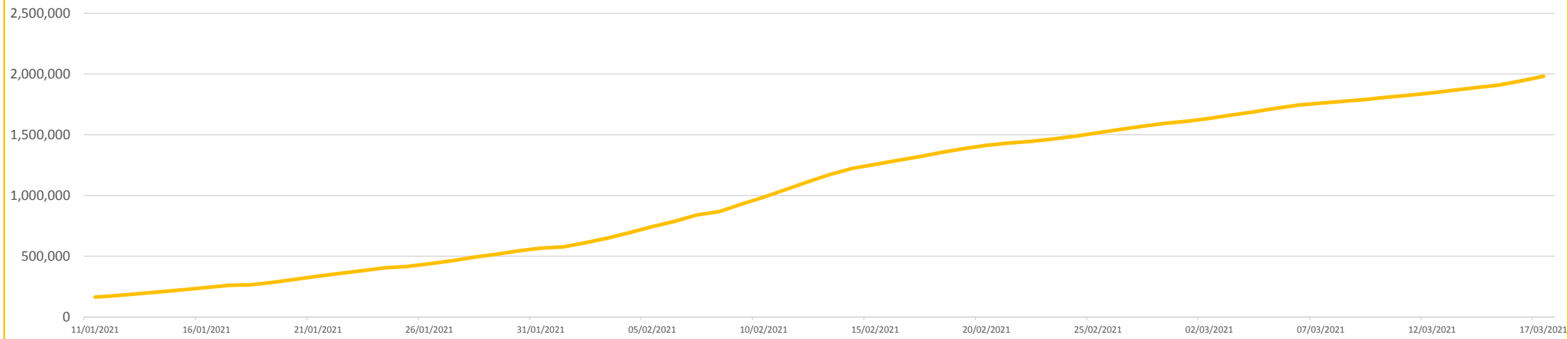

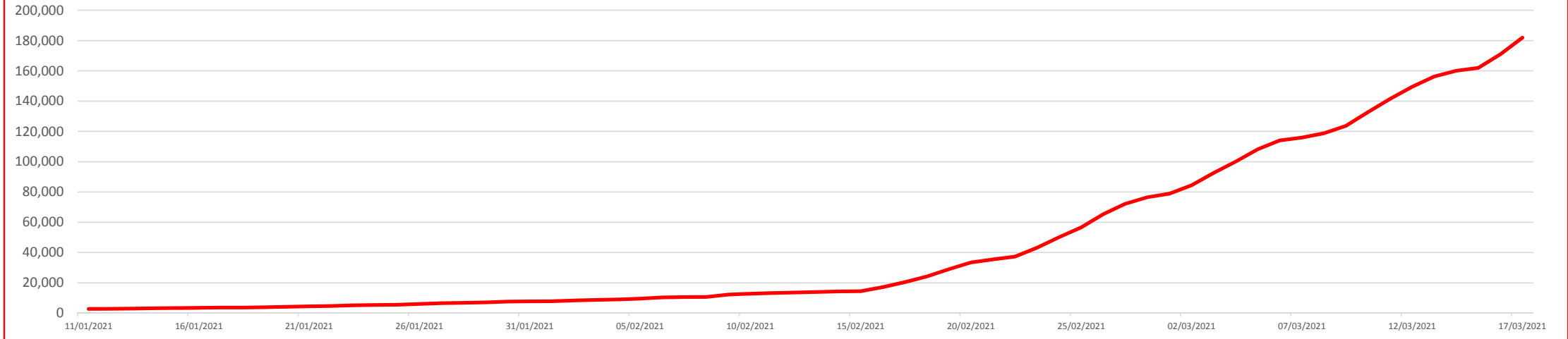


Total Vaccinations Scotland (19th January 2021 – 17th March 2021)
