1. Welcome and introductions

The Chair welcomed members to the meeting.

2. Note of the previous meeting and matters arising

Following on from discussions with COSLA, the Chair noted that although outwith the IAG terms of reference, he was interested to learn about local authority officers having power of entry under the new regulations. ACC Ritchie indicated that although this had not yet been discussed nationally with COSLA, Divisional Commanders are likely to be in discussion with individual local authorities on the matter.

All other matters will be covered in the agenda.

3. Data update

OpTICAL

ACC Ritchie briefed members that the 4E's approach taken by Police Scotland is unchanged. It may be, however, that more flagrant breaches and disregard of the legislation have resulted in quicker escalation through the 4Es, as the most recent weekend saw the highest numbers of FPNs issued over a weekend period since the legislation was introduced. This is being monitored closely. Challenges remain for Police Scotland around enforceable travel regulations.

Professor McVie reported that the analysis of the FPN data relating to the first stage of the pandemic had been completed. A draft report on the additional analysis of FPN data sets is complete and Susan has asked Scottish Government analytical colleagues to undertake a peer review. This report may be ready for circulation to members next week. Once this is complete, Professor McVie will resume work on SCTS data sets, and has offered to undertake further analysis of new CVI data if that is required.

Members acknowledged that the data for the second and subsequent pandemic phases are likely to look very different from the first period, with different levels of regulation and enforcement and a lull in activity over the summer period.

OpTICAL members had also discussed the composition and value of the IAG, with a suggestion from Dr Aston (SIPR) that the group may wish to consider why members consider the group works well, its value, and its contribution to understanding the patterns of behaviour across the country.

Contextual information in reporting

It was emphasised that setting out context when publishing the data will be crucial in assisting understanding of compliance patterns across local communities, particularly as the number of FPNs issued overall is low.

The report for the January SPA board meeting should include a balance of statistical information alongside evidence of lived experience. Suggested additional contacts to help gather this evidence include the Poverty Alliance,

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Action for Scotland, the work of the Scottish Centre for Crime and Justice Research on the impact of the pandemic on particular groups, and Police Scotland networks within the Eastern European community.

Interviews with Police Officers and Staff

Members agreed that a follow up round of police officer and staff interviews early in the New Year would be a useful source of additional evidence, and HMICS indicated that the Inspectorate would be happy to undertake this work.

Citizen Space

No additional entries had been received this week.

The secretariat will discuss with SPA colleagues whether any changes are required to support extended access to the IAG portal, as the work of the group continues.

Martyn Evans reported that the 3rd wave of the SPA Public Survey will be discussed at the November board meeting. SPA officers will be invited to present to the IAG on the findings of this wave of the survey.
