1. Welcome and introductions

The Chair welcomed David Crichton to the meeting. David is retiring from his role as Interim Chair of the SPA. He offered his personal thanks and appreciation for the remarkable contribution the group has made, supporting additional scrutiny of the use of these exceptional temporary powers, but without putting an additional undue burden on the service as it responds to an emergency situation.

He reflected on the role of the group in both challenging and supporting Police Scotland, supporting the SPA's oversight, extending the reach of assurance work across a broad section of society, and adding a unique perspective and value to the range of oversight of policing during the pandemic.

It has been an inspiring piece of work, and he thanked the group, particularly the Chair for his leadership, and for the value and insights shared in reports to the Authority.

3. Data Update

Data and OpTICAL Update

Professor McVie briefed members on evidence from CVI data and her related report.

She outlined trends over time, with just under 100,000 inventions recorded by 3 January. The vast majority are within the first 3E's. Less than 10% resulted in a Fixed Penalty Notice, and less than 1% resulted in arrest or required the use of reasonable force.

In Wave 1 there was more day to day variation, with larger spikes during warm weather, public holidays and weekends. In Wave 2, from mid-September onwards, the pattern of demand shifted increasingly to weekends and house

parties, with less activity mid-week. In Wave 1 most of the interventions occurred in civic/public space, and in Wave 2 more occurred in private space.

The first 3E's remain the dominant form of intervention, with a more robust response used only when necessary. Local circumstances are taken into account by policing teams, and are reflected in the type of intervention.

The Chair thanked Professor McVie for her report, and noted that it will be useful in the forthcoming weeks, to inform further reports to the SPA board. ACC Ritchie confirmed that findings align with what Police Officers are reporting with regard to their own experience on the ground.

The Police Scotland weekly report is available to members via egress, with additional information now available on scenario reporting.

Professor McVie advised that the FPN report is now complete, and will be discussed at the OpTICAL before being presented to the IAG.

The following points were also discussed:

- What is meant by "reasonable force" in specific contexts at the lower end of the scale, for example, escorting people home or to a place of safety, and the potential for strengthening guidance on how this is recorded.
- The role of PIRC, with a request to check when PIRC data for this period is made public. (Action: Secretariat)
- The definition of a key worker, which remains unchanged, albeit more people now qualify, e.g. jurors.

Citizen Space

One additional response has been received.

Jennifer advised that she had recirculated details of the portal to a number of online news organisations. Revised letters providing an update on the group's work have been circulated to members, for IAG members to share with their own networks
