1.1	<p>This paper provides the Scottish Police Authority (SPA) with a weekly update on policing changes seen during Operation TALLA, Police Scotland’s COVID-19 response.</p> <p>This report contains the preceding week’s information and data on changing demands within the service centre, incident attendance and crime. It will also consider our COVID-19 response including our use of the emergency legislation and how we are assisting our officers and staff welfare throughout these challenging times.</p> <p>This update will have a reporting period of Thursday to Wednesday. For the purpose of this report, the week of Thursday 4 March to Wednesday 10 March 2021 is considered.</p>

4.1	<p>This report aligns to both Police Scotland’s Strategic Outcomes and the Operation TALLA Strategic Objectives as set out by DCC Malcolm Graham.</p> <p>This report discusses the flexible and adaptable response to the challenges posed by COVID-19 by Police Scotland (SO1, SO2 and SO5). It further highlights the activities undertaken by Police Scotland to protect our people (SO4). The levels of intervention activity discussed in the report serve to protect our communities from COVID-19 (SO1, SO2). The frequent, transparent publication of papers, such as this, and those published on the Police Scotland website provide engagement with communities, to maintain trust and confidence (SO3).</p>		

5.	Main Report

5.1 CURRENT LANDSCAPE

Scotland continues to operate under the level or tiered system approach, which includes enforceable travel regulations for those local authorities subject to level 3 and 4 restrictions. All of mainland Scotland remains under lockdown.

On the 4 March 2021 the First Minister announced that 1,688,608 people have received their first dose of the vaccine and 100,058 have had their second dose.

Across the weekend of Saturday 6 and Sunday 7 March, several thousand Rangers supporters in Glasgow participated in spontaneous and intense mass gatherings. This was in clear contravention of the COVID restrictions in place to counter the continuing public health crisis. Experienced officers, highly skilled in public order management, took appropriate steps to manage these challenging circumstances to protect people and minimise disruption to communities. They did so with impartiality, professionalism and selfless commitment to public service. During the gatherings, there were 28 arrests and seven fixed penalty notices issued, with police investigations continuing.

The strong relationship of trust policing has with our communities, underpinned by the principle of policing by consent, is vital to the critical role officers and staff play in supporting the public health imperative. To that end, the Independent Advisory Group (IAG) established in April 2020 to provide additional, independent and expert scrutiny of our policing response, has been asked by the Chief Constable to consider the events of the weekend, having regard to the fundamental human rights principles of legality, necessity and proportionality and to consider any relevant issues for the policing of future events over the coming months.

DCC Graham has held a meeting with the relevant ACCs and planning for the remainder of the football season continues to remain under constant review, including arrangements for high profile fixtures or events.

On 8 March the Deputy First Minister announced that all staff and secondary school pupils, who are returning to school, should wear face coverings in classrooms, communal areas and when moving about the school. Also announced was that the government expect all secondary school pupils to return to full time in person learning after the Easter holidays.

On 9 March 2021 the First Minister announced that there would be a relaxation on the rules of meeting up outside, with 4 people from 2 households able to do so from 12 March. This restriction will be different for 12 – 17 year olds with 4 young people from 4 households able to meet up. Also from 12 March outdoor non-contact sports and group exercise will be allowed in groups of up to 15.

On 10 March 2021 1,809,158 people had received their First dose of the vaccine and 132,760 had received their second. This is an increase of 120,550 and 32,702 respectively during this review period.

Coronavirus is still having an impact on absence levels across the organisation; however, they continue to be internally managed by each local policing division. Absence levels and trends are still monitored closely in order to mitigate risk and address any emerging resourcing demands in early course. Police Scotland’s Outbreak Management Team (OMT) remains in

place, providing an internal 'track and trace' function and advice to police officers and staff, as well as engaging with divisions to assist in limiting any spread of coronavirus throughout the organisation. Learning opportunities from previous outbreaks are being identified and collated by the team and these will be communicated across all divisions and departments.

Whilst increased restrictions are in place, including travel restrictions between local authority areas, Police Scotland's approach remains unchanged and continues to promote 'Engage, Explain and Encourage' methods prior to 'Enforcement' action being taken against apparent breaches of legislation. It remains the position that officers may move more quickly through the 4E process if they perceive that persons are engaging in a blatant, conscious and inexcusable breach of regulations, involving repeat locations or individuals and whether an absence of enforcement would damage public confidence in policing.

5.2 SERVICE CENTRE DEMAND

This week, the volume of 101 calls answered has increased by **1%** comparable to last week's figure and the volume of 999 calls has decreased by **3%**. The number of 101 calls and 999 calls answered this year are both lower than the same week last year, **(-5%)** and **(-15%)** respectively.

5.3 INCIDENT DEMAND

Total incident volume has decreased by **2%** from last week's figure and has reduced by **4%** when compared to the same dates in 2020.

In comparison to the same period last year, Public Nuisance incidents have increased by **214%**, while noise incidents have increased by **26%**. Disturbance incidents have decreased by **12%**. In comparison to last week, public nuisance incidents and noise incidents have decreased by **10%** and **2%** respectively, whilst disturbance incidents have increased by **13%**.

5.4 CRIME

Overall crime in the last week is at a lower level than a comparable period last year. With the exception of North East Division, all police divisions have experienced lower crime volume than the same period last year.

The collective volume of recorded crimes for most crime groups is lower when compared to last year, with only Group 5 crimes having risen slightly. The cumulative crime demand for year 2020/21 in every division is lower when compared to 2019/20.

5.5 COVID-19 INTERVENTION ACTIVITY

As stated above, Police Scotland's approach to the use of COVID-19 legislation remains to firstly engage with people, explain the provisions and encourage them to comply with the necessary restrictions, with enforcement action being taken where there are found to be flagrant and blatant breaches of legislation.

Incidents requiring COVID-19 interventions by officers have decreased from **359** last week to **342** this week (-5%). The total number of persons involved in these interventions has increased from **2369** last week to **2617** this week, an increase of **10%**. **1542 (59%)** of the **2617** interventions this week took place in a private dwelling. This is an increase on the previous week's 61%. Figures for this week are accurate as at 11 March 2021.

Since quarantine regulations came into force on travellers entering Scotland from out with the UK on the 15 June 2020, up to and including 10 March 2021, Police Scotland have received **4108** referrals from Public Health Scotland (PHS) relating to potential breaches of quarantine. **778** of these were dealt with by the resolution team and **696** have been dealt with by local policing. **2634** referrals were weeded prior to an incident being raised. In respect of resolved referrals, **80%** of the foreign travellers were found to be complying with quarantine restrictions. In the majority of the remaining referrals, the travellers have been untraced due to a variety of reasons such as inaccurate data provided to PHS or the expiration of the quarantine period prior to persons being traced.

There have been **17** occasions where enforcement has been used in relation to breaches of quarantine regulations generated from Home Office or Public Health Scotland referrals and one report to the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service (COPFS).

5.6 ABSENCE

General employee absence levels have remained fairly consistent over the last week. Divisions and departments are currently coping locally with outbreaks and contact/tracing requirements; however, this is being monitored carefully. Absences related specifically to COVID-19 have increased, with **311** people absent, as of 10 March 2021, up from **307** last week.

5.7 OUTBREAK MANAGEMENT TEAM

Police Scotland's Outbreak Management Team (OMT) respond to and investigate positive cases amongst officers and staff and work in conjunction with the national NHS Test & Protect network to arrive at proportionate, balanced decisions on the identification of individuals at risk after close contact with a positive case and any requirement for self-isolation. This, following consideration of all operational circumstances, the use of PPE and other safety measures, has enabled the safe retention of officers and staff in the workplace and the self-isolation of those agreed to be at heightened risk. The team's work will continue to capture information and the circumstances in respect of specific outbreaks in order that procedures can be reviewed and additional safety measures cascaded and implemented as required.

From inception until 3 March 2021, the OMT has reviewed **835** cases and, from these, **1264** individuals have tested positive for COVID-19. The work of the OMT has led them to trace **1269** individuals who have required to isolate, whilst the NHS has traced **243** individuals. On average, each case leads to **3.5** absences. The work of the OMT has also led to the identification of **83** individuals who had initially been required to self-isolate and were able to return to work.

5.8 COVID-19 NEAR MISSES

'Near miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons e.g. when officers are potentially exposed to COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19. This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE.

The most current 'near miss' figures available for the dates 2 March until 8 March 2021 confirm that **34** forms were submitted. This is a decrease of **60%** from the **84** forms last week.

5.9 GATHERINGS IN PRIVATE DWELLINGS

Scottish Government commissioned data suggests that spread in and between households continues to drive much of the transmission of COVID-19. This analysis has guided the decision to introduce national measures to prevent persons visiting other households in higher risk areas.

Police Scotland have undertaken an assessment of the demand posed by dwelling house gatherings. It should be noted that the methodology of counting of house gatherings is designed to quantify the number of times officers have had to enter a private dwelling or private garden to investigate suspected breach of legislation or guidance, due to the increased risks of COVID transmission associated with these environments; therefore, if officers do not physically attend, or indeed gain entry to the dwelling or garden, this will not be included as a house gathering as there is no evidence there has been one and no increased risk to officers. Information gathered is indicative and should not be considered official police statistics.

Indicative figures from the week of 4 March until 10 March 2021, suggest that Police Scotland attended **457** occurrences of house gatherings throughout the force area, a decrease of **39** from last week (**-8%**). Enforcement levels for FPN have decreased from **613** last week to **492** this week (**-20%**) and arrests have increased from **18** to **23** over the same period (**28%**).

Notable incidents over the past week include:

Lanarkshire

(04/03/21) – Police attended locus on an unrelated matter and confirmed breach of COVID regulations. 1 male charged with 5(2) MDA and FPN issued.

OFFICIAL

(09/03/21) - Report of ongoing party and COVID breach at locus. Police attended and found 5 persons within having a party. Non-residents were dispersed and 5 FPNs were issued.

Forth Valley

(05/03/21) - Report of a noisy gathering within dwelling. Officers attended and traced two males within, with no evidence of a breach of COVID regulations, however one male became aggressive challenging officers to fight and was subsequently arrested and charged with Section 38.

Edinburgh City

(05/03/21) - Small party ongoing. Two persons issued with FPNs and one other male arrested due to a report of him running around the stair/curtilage smashing property with a pole.

(10/03/21) - Report from neighbour regarding party at locus. Police attended and found 12 persons within in breach of regulations. FPNs issued to all present and 10 persons dispersed.

Fife

(05/03/21) - Call regarding noisy music at locus and breach of COVID regulations. Officers attended and dispersed non-residents. 5 FPNs issued.

(06/03/21) - Reports of party at locus and fighting. Entry forced. 4 persons found within. 2 persons arrested for Culpable & Reckless Conduct/Assault. 2 persons dispersed.

Greater Glasgow

(04/03/21) – Report received of a family gathering, police attended and found 19 adults and 14 children within. 18 FPNs issued and persons dispersed.

(10/03/21) - Householder had permitted 7 persons entry to her house. She has already been reported several times. As a result, she was subsequently arrested and held custody.

Renfrewshire and Inverclyde

(06/03/21) – Report of gathering at locus. 18 persons found within where upon the accused refused to accept a warning or leave the locus. On being ushered from the dwelling, the accused pushed an officer and thereafter attempted to strike them on the head, failing to make contact. Householder charged with Culpable & Reckless Conduct and accused arrested. Gathering dispersed.

OFFICIAL

(06/03/21) - Officers attended noise complaint and located non-resident within who was in breach of bail conditions. She stated she had COVID and after discussion with Custody she was reported for offences and told to return home. No contact with officers.

(10/03/21) - Officers called to locus after reports of a party within. Birthday party was observed ongoing. 11 FPNs issued. 10 persons dispersed.

Tayside

(06/03/21) – Report of party ongoing with large group within. Police attended and 20 FPNs issued. Gathering dispersed.

(10/03/21) - Report of party ongoing. Police attended and occupiers having party. 10 persons dispersed and 4 occupants issued FPNs.

North East

(06/03/21) - Gathering of 20 youths within house. Fled on police arrival and loitered outside until dispersed. Occupant charged with Culpable & Reckless Conduct.

Ayrshire

(07/03/21) - Report of football related gathering at locus. Officers attended and spoke to householder who was willing to permit entry, however 14+ guests refused to allow police entry. Entry forced, urgent assistance requested. 3 persons arrested for breach of the peace and obstructing officers. Householder issued with FPN.

(08/03/21) - Report of a party on-going and fights within. Reporter advised that this had been a previous issue at locus and attending officers have also issued previous warnings to householder. Police attended and householder plus 2 persons within. Noisy music also on-going. Householder charged with Culpable & Reckless Conduct and one non-resident issued with FPN.

Argyll and West Dunbartonshire

(08/03/21) - Neighbour reporting a disturbance at locus. Officers' traced householder and neighbour within locus. Both issued with FPNs.

Dumfries and Galloway

(08/03/21) - Report of loud music/party. Entry gained and persons found hiding in loft. 3 persons arrested and charged.

5.10 TRAVEL REGULATIONS

OFFICIAL

At 1800 hours on Friday 20 November 2020, legislative travel restrictions were introduced across local authorities subject to levels 3 and 4 restrictions. The following data comprises travel regulations interventions from 4 March until 10 March 2021 inclusive.

Police Scotland has carried out **208** interventions and issued **79** FPN in respect of travel regulations within the time frame, compared to the **178** interventions and **52** FPN recorded last week.

Notable incidents during this period include:

Lothians & Scottish Borders

(05/03/21) - Report of moto-bikes seen leaving Car Park in Jedburgh. It was noted that two vans were both registered from the Sunderland area. Intermittent observations were made of the vehicles and 3 moto-bikes and persons returned to vans. All issued with FPNs and tickets for number plate offences.

Argyll & West Dunbartonshire Division

(04/03/21) - Call from concerned parent from Coatbridge stating her daughter and 3 other females had attended to climb the Cobbler and got into difficulty due to inclement weather. Mountain Rescue Team called out and party subsequently traced. 1 FPN issued and 3 persons (under 18) warned.

(06/03/21) - 2 persons on boat at marina having travelled from out with their Local Authority area (Forth Valley). Both issued with FPNs.

North East

(05/03/21) - Police on mobile patrol observed a motor vehicle with 2 persons on board. Vehicle stopped and persons from London stated that they were travelling Britain and were planning on staying with an associate in Aberdeen. Both issued FPNs. Resident of property still to be traced.

Forth Valley

(05/03/21) - 2 persons travelled from Renfrewshire & Inverclyde area to climb Conic Hill, Balmaha when one went over their ankle and required Mountain Rescue Team to remove them from hill. Both reported for Culpable & Reckless Conduct.

Highlands and Islands

(05/03/21) - Person seen operating a drone in the Glencoe area – spoken to and established that he had travelled from Bonnybridge. FPN issued.

Ayrshire

(08/03/21) - Roads policing at Irvine stopped a vehicle, the occupants had travelled from Glasgow. FPN's issued.

Edinburgh

OFFICIAL

(09/03/21) - Vehicle stopped in Newbridge. 4 adults from 3 households and 1 child traced within. All persons had travelled from different towns in West Lothian. FPNs issued to all adults.

Lanarkshire

(09/03/21) - Vehicle stop carried out on M74. Family from Birmingham within. 1 male issued FPN.

Dumfries and Galloway

(10/03/21) – Male had left his home address in Durham in order to travel to Scotland to visit his ex-partner and children. The male was contacted via telephone and suitably advised. He realised his mistake and returned home. Warning given.

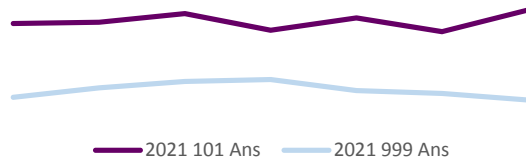

Service Centre Demand

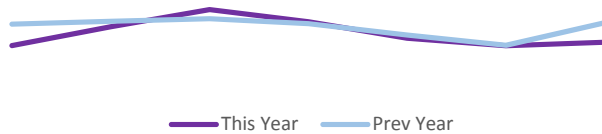

From 28/08/2020 – 10/03/2021

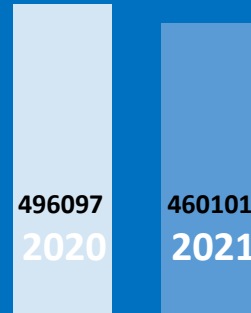

Crime has continued to trend at levels lower than the seasonal average, and total crime volume year to date continues to remain lower (7%) than last year.



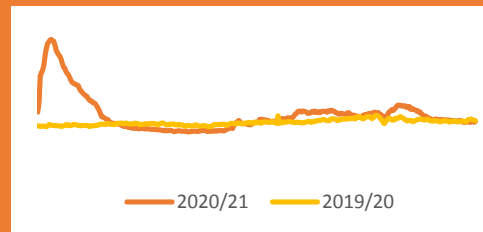

Absence

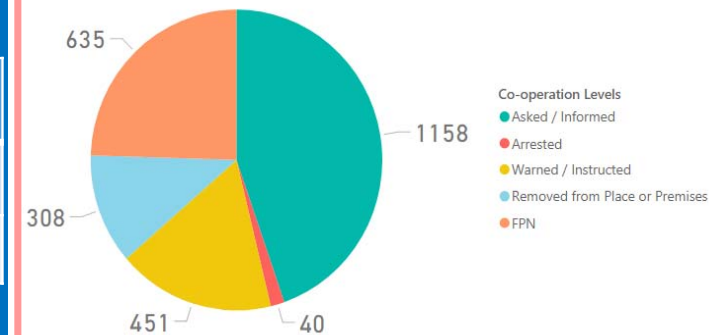


Absences throughout the week have remained relatively static however continue to trend above levels when compared to 2020. Absences remain significantly below the peak in April 2020.

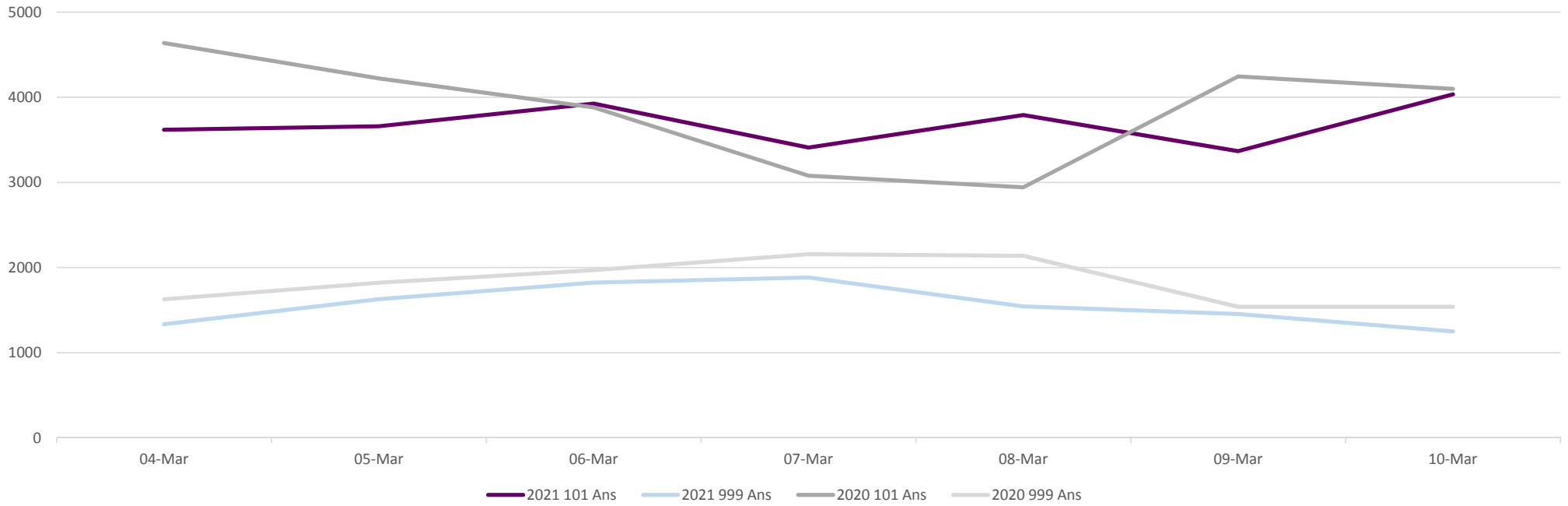

2021 vs 2020 Calls Answered



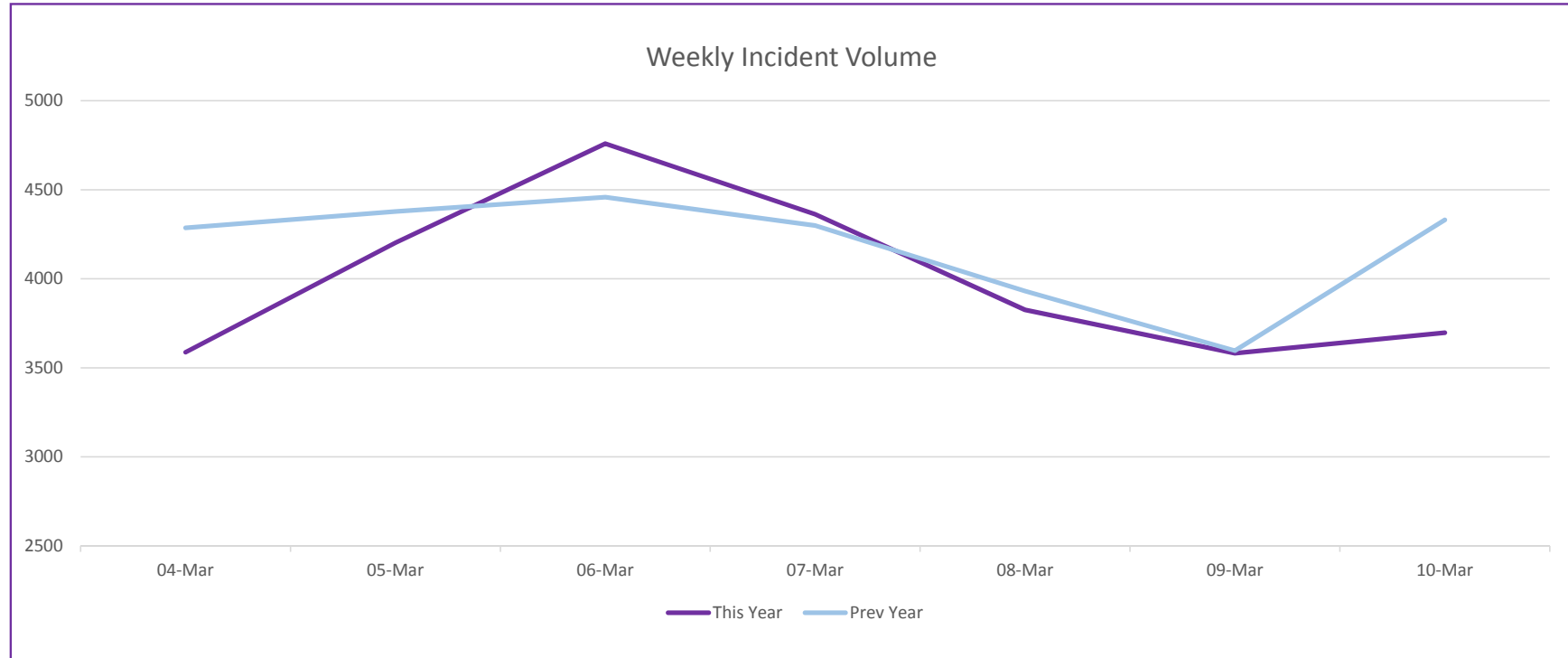

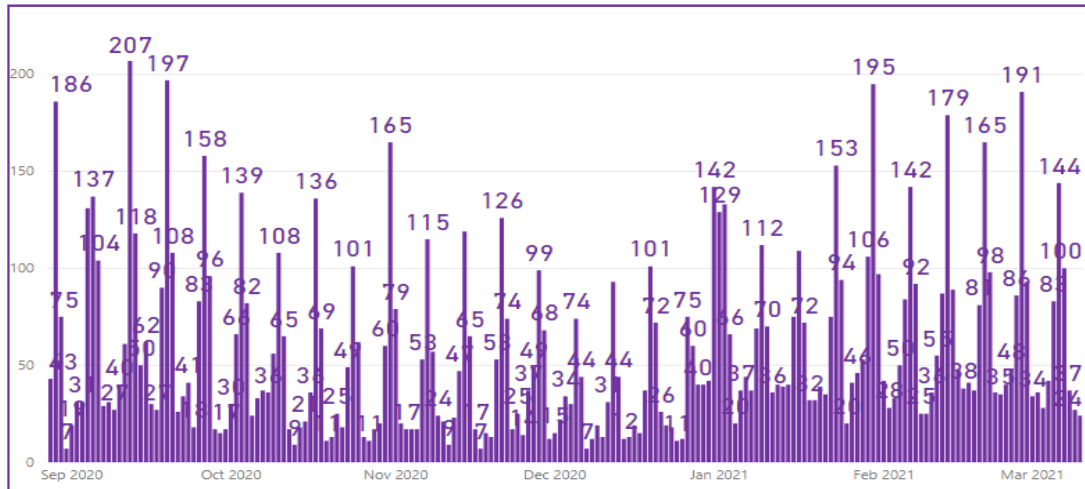

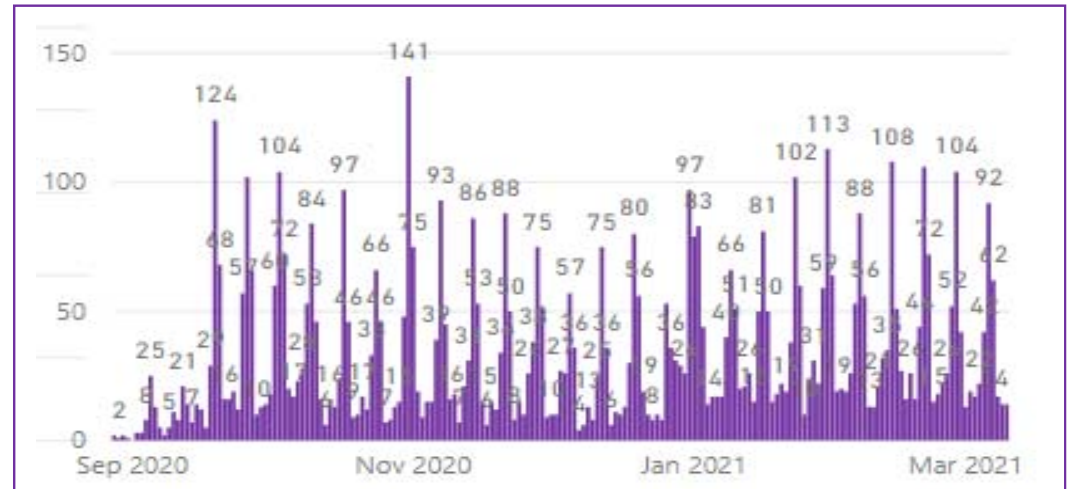
Incident Demand – House Gatherings (28th August 2020 – 10th March 2021)

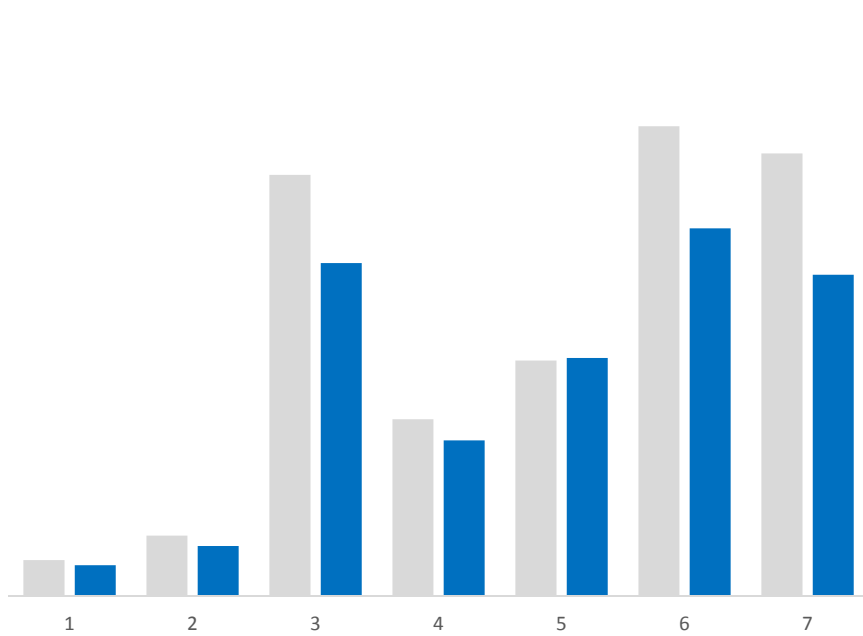

Weekly Crime Demand (1st – 7th March 2021)

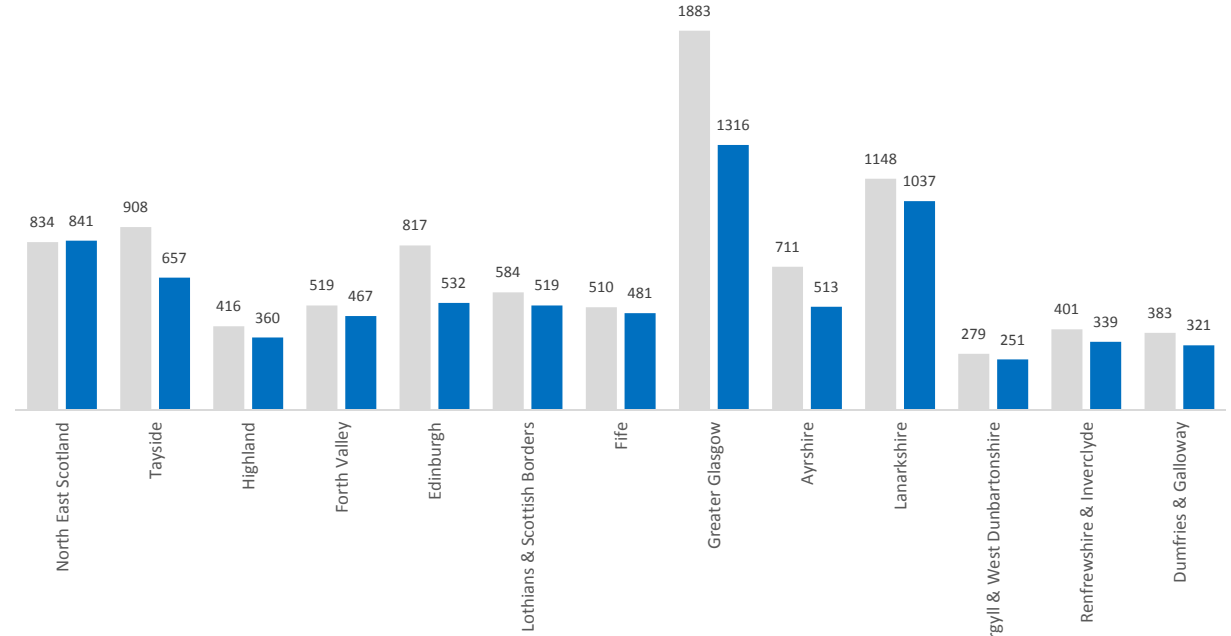

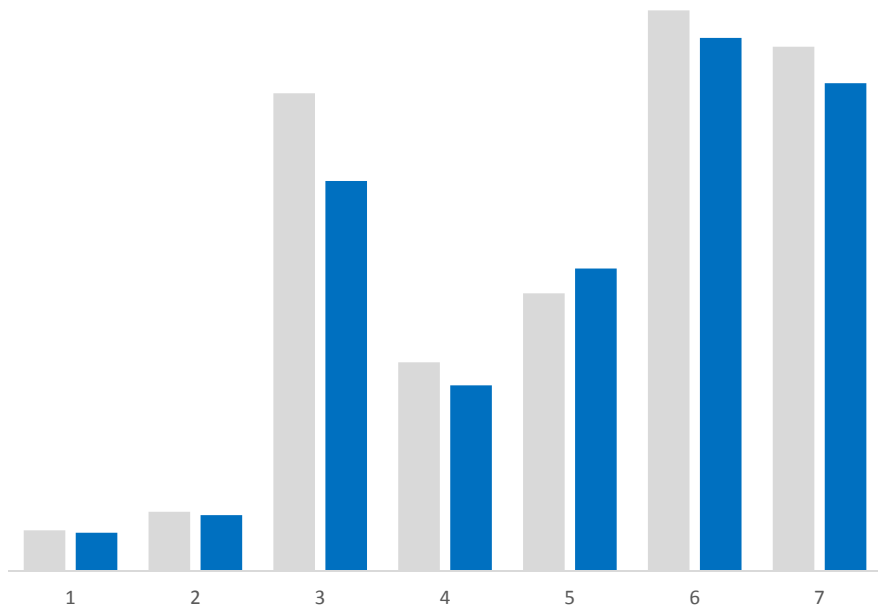

Cumulative Crime Demand (16th March 2020 – 7th March 2021)

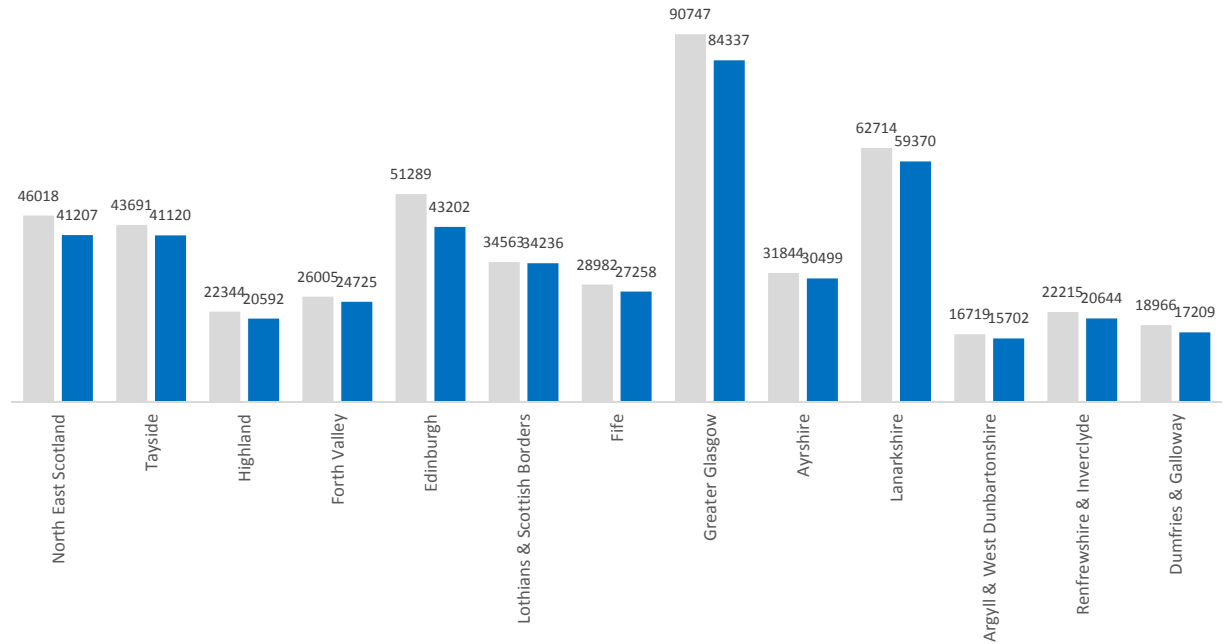
Total Crime by Group

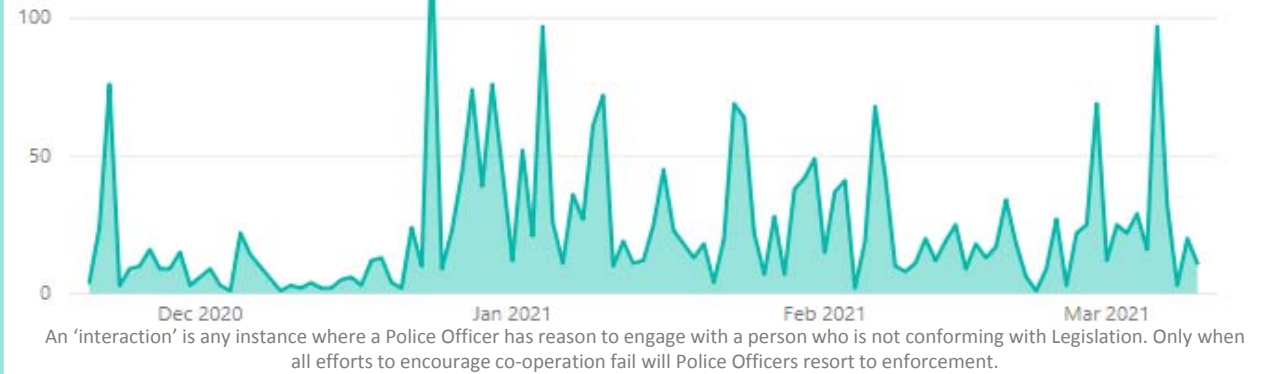

Travel Regulation Co-operation (20th November 2020 – 10th March 2021)

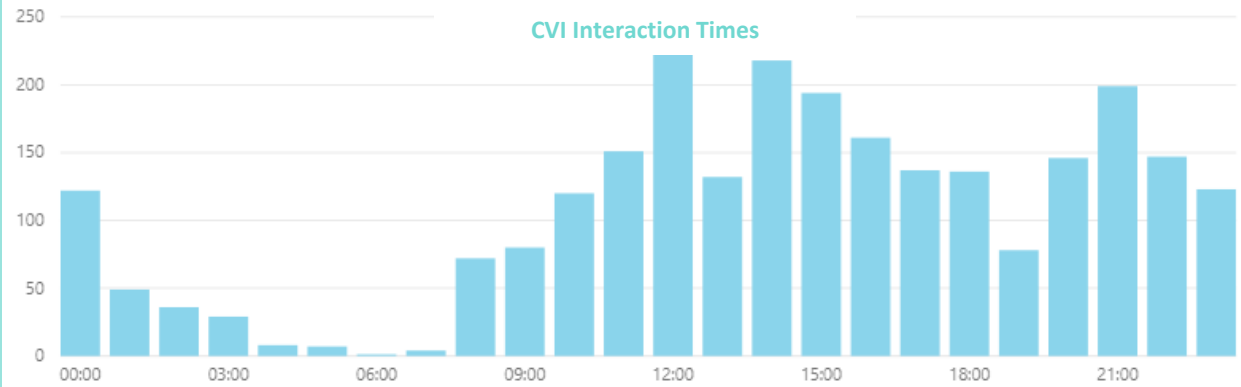
All Time Cooperation Levels

In order to report upon policing interventions in respect of the newly introduced Travel Regulations regarding travel to or from tiers 3 and 4, the CVI system has been updated. The above data is a sub-set of the wider CVI interventions reported on the previous slides and should not be considered as 'in addition to' the previous overall CVI activity slides.

In response to the introduction of The Health Protection (Coronavirus) (Restrictions) (Scotland) Regulations 2020 and Coronavirus Act 2020, Police Scotland developed a 'Coronavirus Interventions' (CVI) recording system. This system allowed Police Scotland to begin gathering data in relation to the public co-operation levels with the new legislation. This system relies on Police Officers manually updating the system with the co-operation level when they encounter an individual in contravention of the new legislation.

Due to the manual input required to form this data set, the contents of this slide are indicative only. Actual figures will differ from those recorded on Crime Systems (please see slide 11), may be subject to change, and cannot be considered Official Police Statistics. They do provide an indication of the public co-operation levels across Scotland.

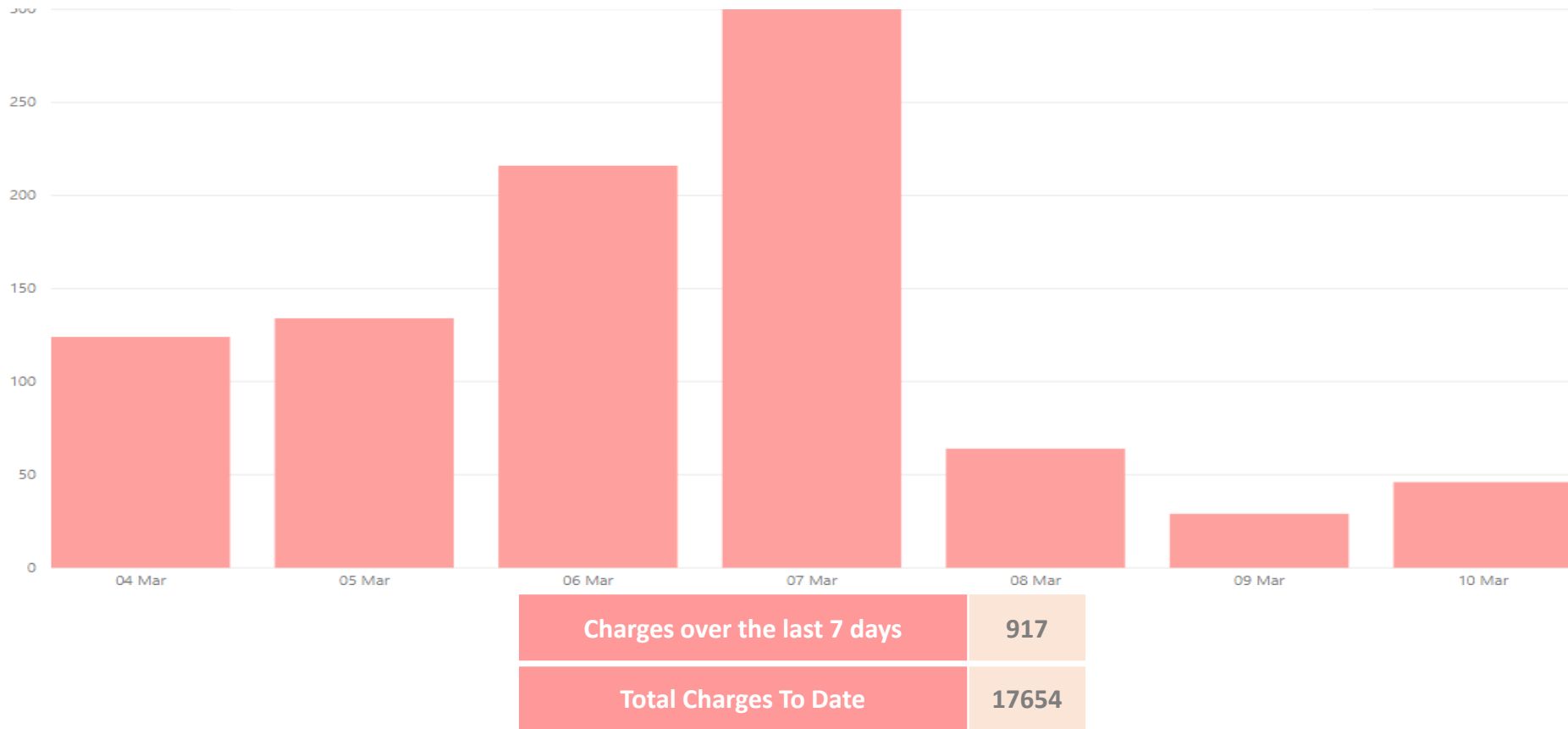
'Enforcement' of Coronavirus specific legislation

The following is a summary of all 'enforcement' action in relation to both The Health Protection (Coronavirus) (Restrictions) (Scotland) Regulations 2020 and Coronavirus Act 2020.

This includes all Fixed Penalty Notices issued and processed by Police Scotland. It also includes all occasions that a charge was libelled and recorded on Police Scotland's Crime Recording System against a person in relation to the aforementioned legislation. This is a true value of the volume of recorded 'enforcement' activity, but does not provide the granularity of the Coronavirus Intervention (CVI) recording system and does not capture the earlier phases of the '4 E's' approach.

These values remain subject to change as offences are retrospectively added or amended and do not match the indicative 'enforcement' values from the CVI recording system.

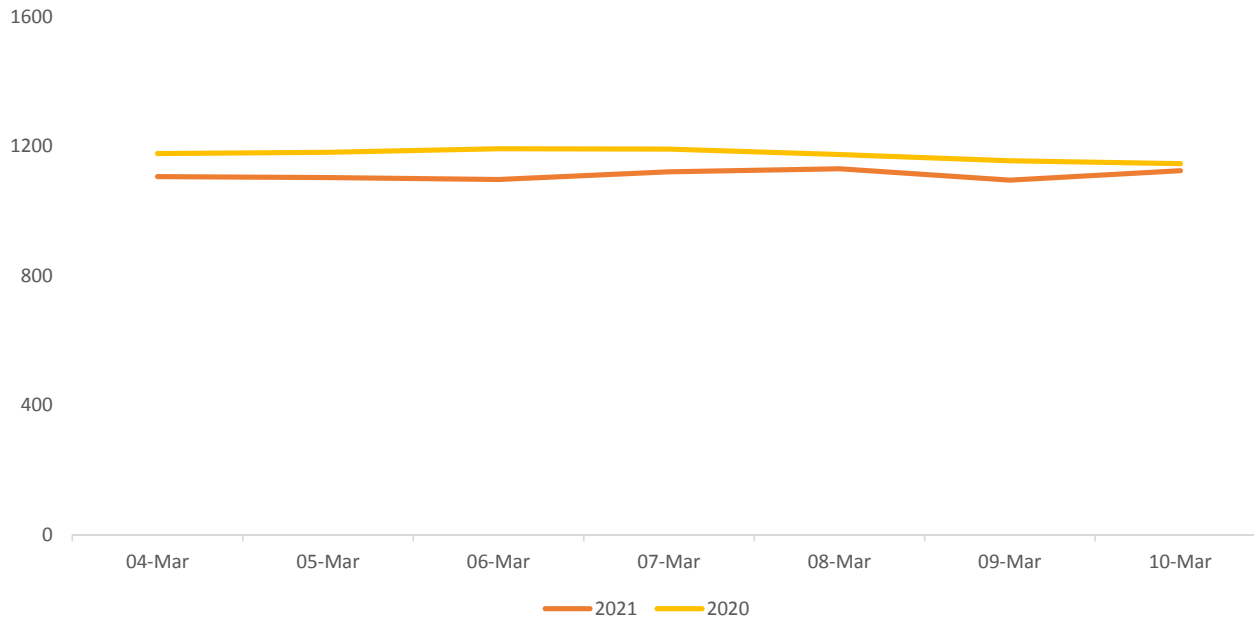

Weekly Absence Levels Line Graph – Comparison of last year to this year

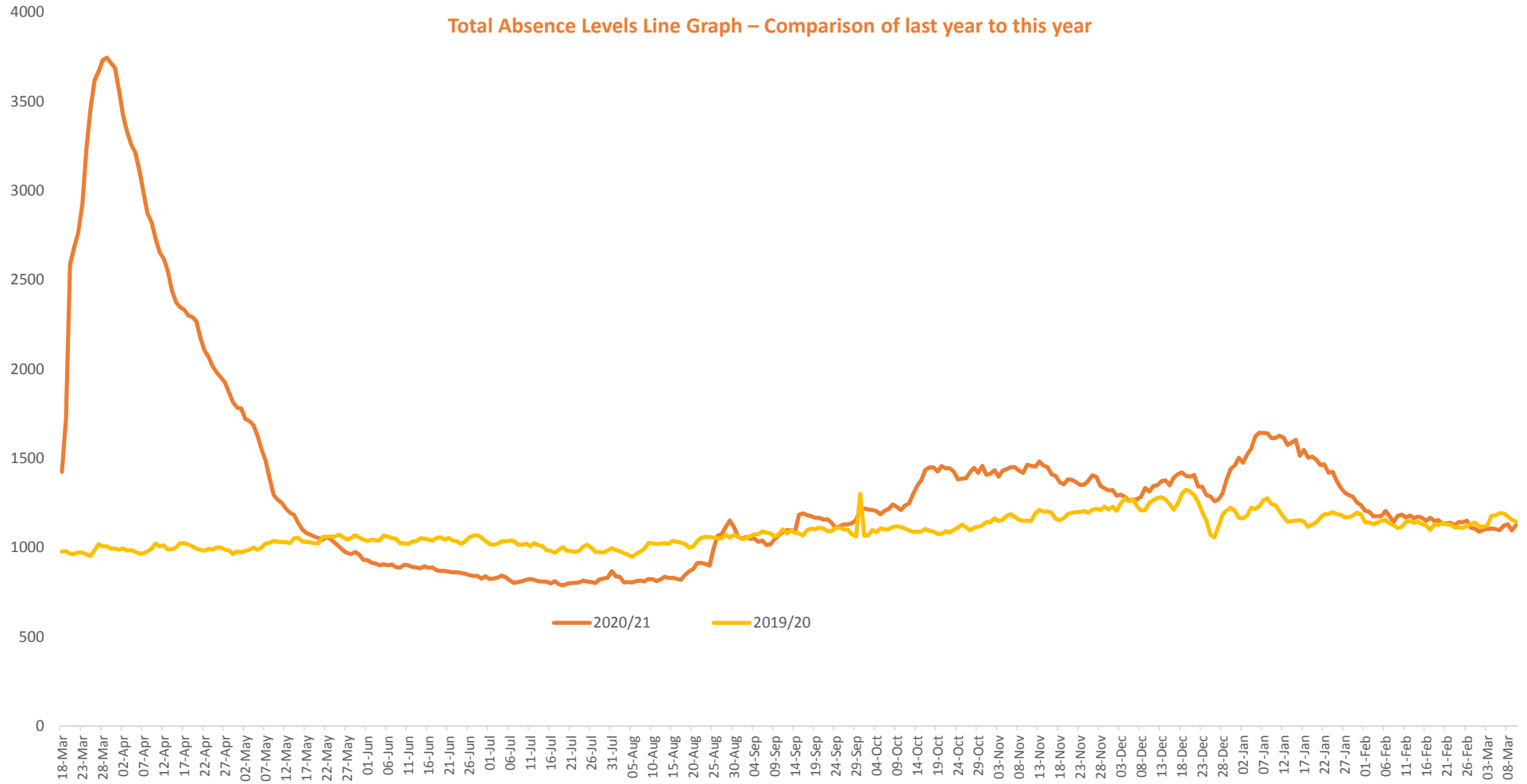

Total Absence (18th March 2020 – 10th March 2021)

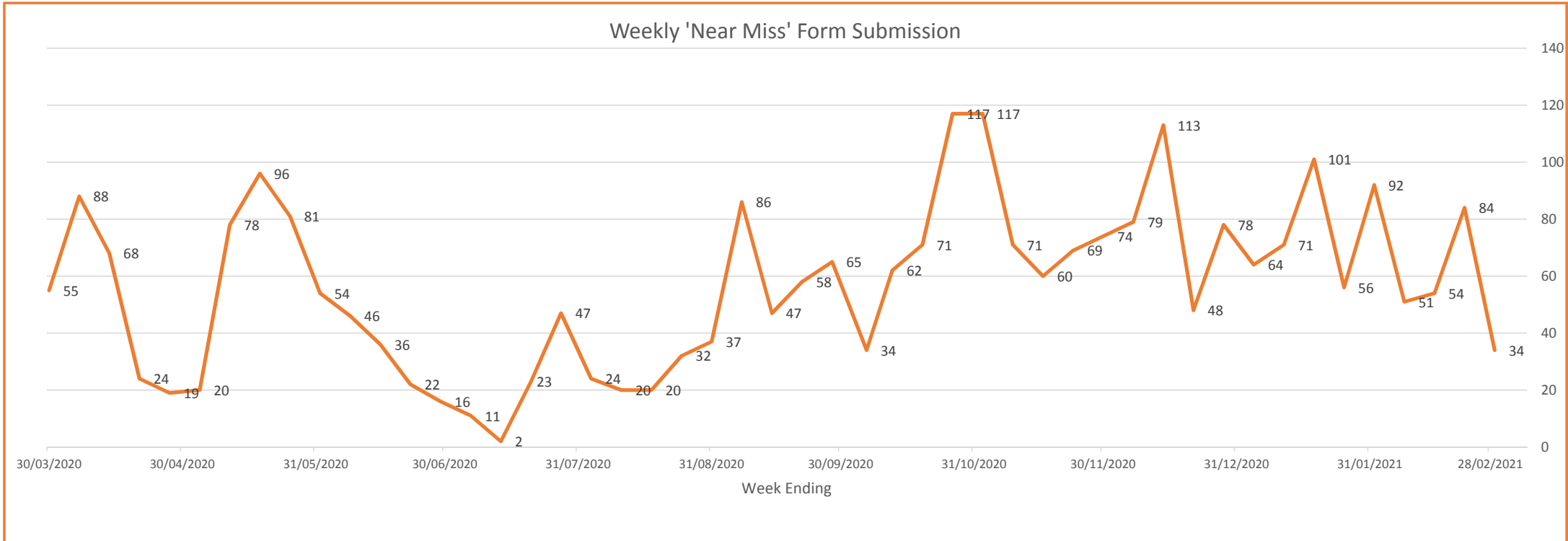

Near Miss and Testing Data (w/e 23rd March – 8th March 2021)



'Near miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons. i.e. when officers are potentially exposed to: COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19.

This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE. This number of 'Near Miss' weekly submissions is up slightly from last week.

The amount of forms submitted continues to be attributable to the process for requesting an asymptomatic COVID-19 screening test due to an occupational risk, requiring the submission of a 'near miss' form. Many of the reports would not have been submitted without this requirement. The number of incidents where a lack of PPE is identified has not risen.

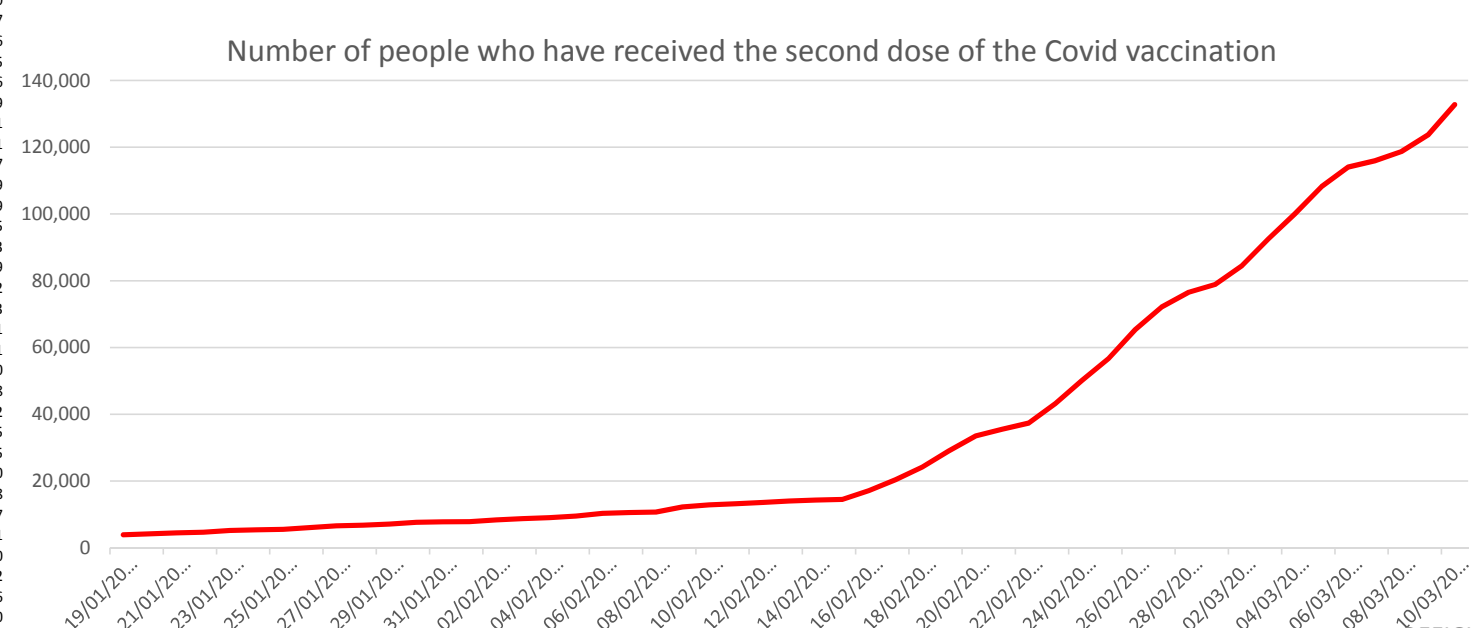
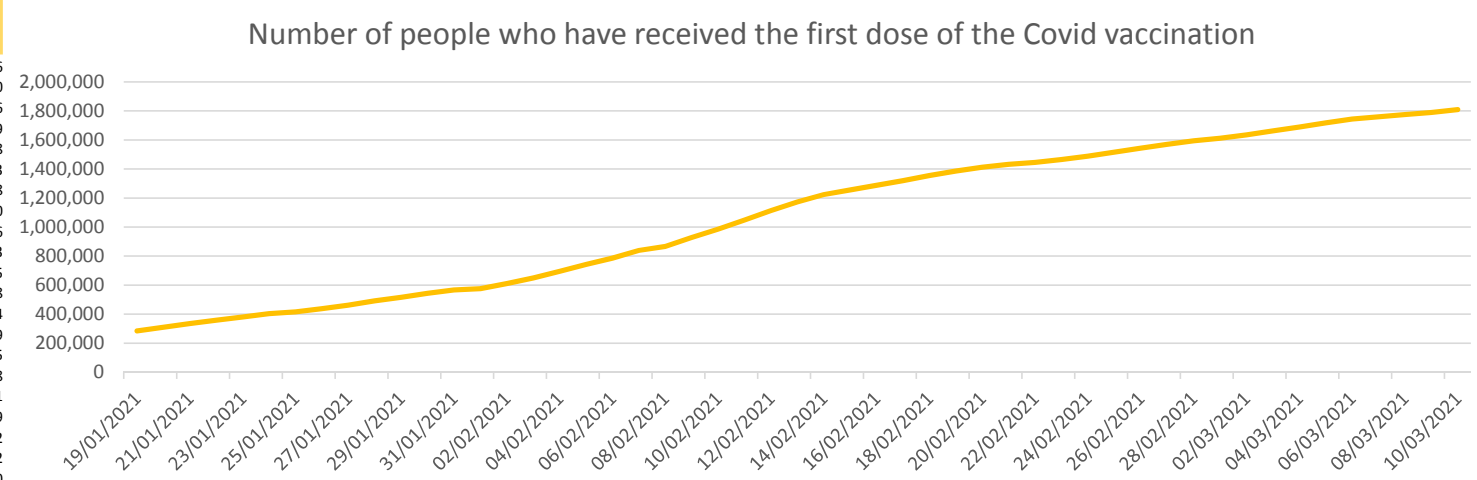
