5. Main Report

### 5.1 CURRENT LANDSCAPE

Over the last week, Police Scotland have continued their support of communities throughout the country as we negotiate through the dynamic pandemic landscape and new national restrictions which were introduced on 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2020.

Police Scotland's approach has remained unchanged throughout the pandemic period, promoting 'Engage, Explain and Encourage' prior to 'Enforcement' action being taken and this remains the correct course of action where appropriate. Notwithstanding, officers have been informed that they may take enforcement action at their discretion, by taking into account whether persons are engaging in a blatant, conscious breach of regulations, if repeat locations or individuals are involved and whether an absence of enforcement would damage public confidence in policing.

Throughout Scotland, Coronavirus cases are increasing, particularly across the central belt. A number of occurrences have affected police officers and staff. These outbreaks are beginning to impact on frontline policing delivery, however these are being monitored closely and where appropriate plans are in place to move resources to meet demand. Police Scotland have established an Outbreak Management Team (OMT) to carry out an internal 'track and trace' function and offer advice to police officers and staff and they continue to engage with divisions to assist in limiting any spread of coronavirus within Police Scotland.

Due to the increase in cases throughout the country, Phase 3 of the Scottish Government's route map through and out of the pandemic, has been paused, and the First Minister announced further restrictions on 7<sup>th</sup> October 2020 which came into effect on 9<sup>th</sup> October 2020. These restrictions cover the hospitality industry, with associated guidance being issued on travel between Health Authority areas. These restrictions were originally scheduled to expire on 26<sup>th</sup> October however Scottish Government has announced an extension until at least 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2020.

Police Scotland anticipate that these new restrictions will bring a further period of adjustment for the communities of Scotland and acknowledge the sacrifices already made by individuals in order to comply with legislation and guidance. It is imperative; however, that the communities are encouraged to continue to support the restrictions and avoid complacency. Therefore, officers are guided to maintain the 4Es approach whilst being mindful of flagrant and blatant breaches of legislation, which may require a more robust approach in line with public expectation.

On Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> October 2020 Scottish Government announced the introduction of a 5 tier system which could see a range of localised restrictions placed on areas based upon prevailing infection rates.

#### 5.2 SERVICE CENTRE DEMAND

In the last week, the volume of 101 calls answered is very similar to last week's figure and the volume of 999 calls is higher, having increased 7%. 101 calls answered are still trending at lower figures than the same time last year at approximately -27%. 999 calls are 5% higher when compared with the same week last year. This rise in 999s appears to relate to increases on the weekend days and could be partly attributable to the Rangers vs Celtic football match.

#### 5.3 INCIDENT DEMAND

Total incident volumes have increased by 2% since last week, there has been an 11% decrease on incident volumes when compared to the same dates in 2019. Public nuisance has increased by 16% on last week's figures and noise incidents are similar, having decreased by 1% on last week's figures. Disturbance incidents have increased on last week's figures by 14%. Public nuisance and noise calls remain at higher levels than last year and disturbance calls are showing at slightly lower levels than those of last year.

#### 5.4 CRIME

Crime volume continues to remain lower than seasonal average. Overall crime in the last week is at a lower level than a comparable period last year. All divisions have experienced crime volumes of a lower level than the same period last year with the exception of Fife which has seen an increase of 22% on last year's figures.

The volume of recorded crimes for every crime group (Group 1-7) is also lower when compared to last year.

#### 5.5 COVID-19 INTERVENTION ACTIVITY

Throughout the last week, Police Scotland's approach to the use of COVID-19 legislation remains to firstly engage with people, explain the provisions and encourage them to comply with the necessary restrictions with enforcement action being taken where there are found to be flagrant and blatant breaches of legislation.

In the last seven days, Police Scotland officers attended 16,801 incidents. This figure is a 2% increase from last week. This brings some context to the incidents requiring COVID-19 intervention, whereby there were 896 COVID-19 interventions recorded on the CVI system this week, 73% of which took place within private dwellings.

Since quarantine regulations came into force on travellers entering Scotland from outwith the UK on the 15<sup>th</sup> June up to and including 18<sup>th</sup> October, Police Scotland have received 537 referrals from Public Health Scotland (PHS) relating to potential breaches of quarantine, 285 of which were dealt with by the resolution team and 251 of which have been dealt with by local policing. In 65% of resolved referrals, the travellers were found to be complying with quarantine restrictions. In the majority of the remaining referrals, the

travellers have been untraced due to a variety of reasons such as inaccurate data provided to PHS or the expiration of the quarantine period prior to persons being traced.

There has been seven FPNs issued in relation to breaches of Travel Regulations generated from Home Office or Public Health Scotland referrals. This is an increase of 2 FPNs from last week.

A notable incident relating to breach of travel regulations occurred in Greater Glasgow division whereby a female arrived in Scotland from Kenya and was required to quarantine. Officers attended and spoke with her husband, who confirmed she was not self-isolating and had gone to work. Female works within Residential unit assisting people with disabilities. Officers attended and she was dismissive of her quarantine. She was charged with a breach of the travel regulations.

#### 5.6 ABSENCE

Over the past week, employee absence levels have continued to increase. This rise is partly attributable to the identification of confirmed COVID-19 cases which has resulted in several groups of officers being required to self-isolate as well as a rise in tracing figures. Those absences related to COVID-19 have continued to increase and are currently sitting at 546, compared to 460 last week.

#### 5.7 OFFICER AND STAFF COVID-19 SCREENING

People & Development continue to support our workforce, providing reassurance to officers, staff and in specific circumstances their family members who are symptomatic, to assist with returning officers and staff to work as soon as possible. Symptomatic testing arranged up to the 21<sup>st</sup> October 2020 now totals 1411. The number of tests organised by Police Scotland sits at over 3200.

From all testing, 458 have returned as positive for COVID-19.

Testing of asymptomatic officers and staff based on risk commenced on 14<sup>th</sup> May and 523 tests have been arranged up to and including 21<sup>st</sup> October 2020. 14 of these tests have returned a positive result.

Contact tracing numbers are not available for this period.

#### 5.8 COVID-19 NEAR MISSES

'Near-miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons e.g. when officers are potentially exposed to COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19. This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE.

The most current 'near miss' figures available for the dates 13<sup>th</sup> October until 19<sup>th</sup> October 2020 show that 62 forms were submitted. This is an increase on the previous week, where 34 forms were submitted.

#### 5.9 GATHERINGS IN PRIVATE DWELLINGS

Scottish Government commissioned data suggests that spread in and between households continues to drive much of the transmission of COVID-19 at the present time. This analysis has guided the decision to introduce national measures to stop persons visiting other households.

Police Scotland have undertaken an assessment of the demand posed by house-gatherings. The counting of house gathering methodology is designed to quantify the number of time officers have had to enter a private dwelling to investigate suspected breach of legislation or guidance, due to the increased risks of COVID transmission associated with these environments. If officers have not been assigned, or attend several hours later due to other demands and do not enter the premises, but, for example, write off the incident 'house in darkness, no noise', this will not be included as a house gathering as there is no evidence there has been one and no increased risk to officers. Information gathered is indicative and should not be considered police statistics.

Indicative figures from the week of 12<sup>th</sup> October – 18<sup>th</sup> October 2020 suggest that Police Scotland attended over 307 occurrences of house gatherings throughout the force area. This is a decrease from the 361 attended the previous week.

Notable incidents over the past week include:

Dumfries and Galloway - Repeat offender had 6 persons within property. He was also hiding a missing person. He was arrested for culpable and reckless conduct and Police Obstruction.

Edinburgh - Student party with 17 persons present clearly in breach of regulations, many did not engage with officers resulting in 15 FPNs issued.

Argyll and Dunbartonshire - Officers attended noisy party in Clydebank. Occupants and visitors refused to disperse when engaged by police. 5 Fixed Penalty notices were then issued and 1 male was arrested for threatening and abusive behaviour.

Renfrewshire & Inverclyde - Police called to ongoing house party at an AirBnB property. Entry was permitted and 13 adults from numerous households were found within. Several calls through night for locus. All 13 were issued Covid FPNs and the property was emptied and secured.





#### **House Gatherings in Private Dwellings**


From 12<sup>th</sup> October – 18<sup>th</sup> October police attended 307 'House Gatherings' Incidents.

#### <u>Crime Volume (9 March – Present compared to Previous Year)</u>



Absences throughout the entire week has trended above levels when compared to 2019.









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
### Cumulative Service Centre Demand (19th March – 21st October 2020)







# **Incident Demand – House Gatherings (31st August – 18th October 2020)**

### **Attended 'House Gatherings' Breaching Restrictions**









# Weekly Crime Demand (12th October – 18th October 2020)












### 'Enforcement' of Coronavirus specific legislation


This includes all Fixed Penalty Notices issued and processed by Police Scotland. It also includes all occasions that a charge was libelled and recorded on Police Scotland's Crime Recording System against a person in relation to the aforementioned legislation. This is a true value of the volume of recorded 'enforcement' activity, but does not provide the granularity of the Coronavirus Intervention (CVI) recording system and does not capture the earlier phases of the '4 E's' approach.

These values remain subject to change as offences are retrospectively added or amended and do not match the indicative 'enforcement' values from the CVI recording system.



'Near miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons. i.e. when officers are potentially exposed to: COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19.


This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE. This number of 'Near Miss' weekly submissions has increased from the previous week.

The amount of forms submitted continues to be attributable to the process for requesting an asymptomatic COVID-19 screening test due to an occupational risk, requiring the submission of a 'near miss' form. Many of the reports would not have been submitted without this requirement. The number of incidents where a lack of PPE is identified has not risen.

No figures should be considered as Official Police Statistics. These may not yet have been verified or validated.
