5. Main Report

#### 5.1 CURRENT LANDSCAPE

Police Scotland has continued its support of communities throughout the country during the coronavirus pandemic and the first full week of the implementation of the national five tier restriction system, which came into effect on 2 November 2020.

This process implements increased or reduced restrictions in response to local infection rates and currently remain between levels 1 and 3 of the 0 to 4 scale. The first weekly review of these restrictions has been carried out, with further changes due to come into effect on 13 November 2020 in response to localised fluctuations.

Throughout Scotland, there is evidence of coronavirus cases still increasing in some parts of the country, although, encouragingly, there are indications of reduction in some local authority areas. It is too early to gauge whether the tier system is being sufficiently effective in these reductions to influence the easing of restrictions and downward movement through the tier scale. Data in respect of outbreak management continues to be monitored closely by the Scottish Government and early indications suggest that regular review seems likely.

Infectious outbreaks are still occurring throughout Police Scotland, affecting officers and staff; however, absence numbers are slowly reducing and the impact on frontline policing is being managed successfully by local divisions with robust resource allocation processes in place to ensure demand is met. Absence continues to be scrutinised closely to mitigate such risk in early course. Police Scotland's Outbreak Management Team (OMT) remains in place to carry out an internal 'track and trace' function and offer advice to police officers and staff, as well as engaging with divisions to assist in limiting any spread of coronavirus throughout the organisation.

Police Scotland's approach has remained unchanged throughout the pandemic period, promoting 'Engage, Explain and Encourage' prior to 'Enforcement' action being taken. It remains the position that officers may move more quickly through the 4E process if they perceive that persons are engaging in a blatant, conscious and inexcusable breach of regulations, involving repeat loci or individuals and whether an absence of enforcement would damage public confidence in policing.

#### 5.2 SERVICE CENTRE DEMAND

In the last week, the volume of 101 calls answered has increased by 6% from last week's figure whilst the volume of 999 calls has decreased by 1%. 101 calls answered continue to trend at lower levels than the same time last year (8% lower). 999 calls are 11% lower when compared with the same week last year.

#### 5.3 INCIDENT DEMAND

Total incident volumes has decreased around 14% from last week's figure. There has been a more significant decrease of 22% when compared to the same dates in 2019. Public nuisance and noise incidents remain comparable with last week, whilst the number of disturbance incidents have decreased by almost 11%. When compared with 2019, disturbance incidents have dropped 26%, whereas public nuisance and noise incidents have increased 69% and 11% respectively. This substantial rise in public nuisance calls may be attributed to the implementation of coronavirus legislation, as it is apparent that a significant number of breach of restriction reports are coded as 'public nuisance' on Police Scotland's incident management system.

#### 5.4 CRIME

Crime volume continues to remain lower than seasonal average. Overall crime in the last week is at a lower level than a comparable period last year with the exception of group five crimes which are 14% higher. Seven out of the thirteen police divisions have experienced lower crime volume than the same period last year; however, North East, Forth Valley, Lothians & Scottish Borders, Fife, Ayrshire and Dumfries & Galloway divisions have all seen a slight increase on last year's figures.

The volume of recorded crimes for every crime group, with the exception of Group 5 crimes, are also lower when compared to last year. The crime demand in every division is lower cumulatively when compared to the previous year.

## 5.5 COVID-19 INTERVENTION ACTIVITY

As stated above, Police Scotland's approach to the use of COVID-19 legislation remains to firstly engage with people, explain the provisions and encourage them to comply with the necessary restrictions, with enforcement action being taken where there are found to be flagrant and blatant breaches of legislation.

In the last seven days, Police Scotland officers attended 14,644 incidents, a reduction of 16% from last week.

Similarly, incidents requiring COVID-19 interventions by officers have also reduced, though by a slightly higher 25%. 69% of the 1,985 interventions recorded on the CVI system this week took place within private dwellings compared with 74% last week. This is a slight reduction from the recent trend; however, the period analysed included Guy Fawkes celebrations which may reflect on the marginal shift from dwelling interventions to those in a public place.

Since quarantine regulations came into force on travellers entering Scotland from out with the UK on the 15 June, up to and including 8 November 2020, Police Scotland have received 1593 referrals from Public Health Scotland (PHS) relating to potential breaches of quarantine, 468 of which were dealt with by the resolution team and 366 of which have been dealt with by local policing. 752 referrals were weeded prior to an incident being raised. In respect of resolved referrals, 78% of the travellers were found to be complying with quarantine restrictions. In the majority of the remaining referrals, the travellers have

been untraced due to a variety of reasons such as inaccurate data provided to PHS or the expiration of the guarantine period prior to persons being traced.

There has been ten FPN issued in relation to breaches of Travel Regulations generated from Home Office or Public Health Scotland referrals and one report to the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service (COPFS).

#### 5.6 ABSENCE

Employee absence levels have reduced slightly throughout the week, but continue to be significantly higher when compared to a similar period last year. COVID-19 cases still continue to emerge, although at a lower rate than recent weeks. Contact and tracing processes, both internal and NHS, have an additional impact on absence rates in terms of the requirement for further officers to self-isolate. Nevertheless, those absences related to COVID-19 have decreased slightly from last week, currently **503** from 512.

#### 5.7 OFFICER AND STAFF COVID-19 SCREENING

People & Development continue to support our workforce, providing reassurance to officers, staff and in specific circumstances their family members who are symptomatic and to assist with returning officers and staff to work as soon as possible. Symptomatic testing arranged up to the 11 November 2020 now totals 1416. The number of tests organised by Police Scotland sits at over 3660.

From all testing, 610 have returned as positive for COVID-19.

Testing of asymptomatic officers and staff based on risk commenced on 14 May and 604 tests have been arranged up to and including 13 November 2020. 18 of these tests have returned a positive result.

#### 5.8 COVID-19 NEAR MISSES

'Near miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons e.g. when officers are potentially exposed to COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19. This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE.

The most current 'near miss' figures available for the dates 3 November until 9 November 2020 confirm that 117 forms were submitted. This is identical to last week.

#### 5.9 GATHERINGS IN PRIVATE DWELLINGS

Scottish Government commissioned data suggests that spread in and between households continues to drive much of the transmission of COVID-19. This analysis has guided the decision to introduce national measures to prevent persons visiting other households in higher risk areas.

Police Scotland have undertaken an assessment of the demand posed by dwelling house gatherings. It should be noted that the methodology of counting of house gatherings is designed to quantify the number of times officers have had to enter a private dwelling or private garden to investigate suspected breach of legislation or guidance, due to the increased risks of COVID transmission associated with these environments; therefore, if officers do not physically attend, or indeed gain entry to the dwelling or garden, this will not be included as a house gathering as there is no evidence there has been one and no increased risk to officers. Information gathered is indicative and should not be considered police statistics.

Indicative figures from the week of 2 November until 8 November 2020, suggest that Police Scotland attended over 296 occurrences of house gatherings throughout the force area. This is a decrease from the 368 attended the previous week, which had a notable spike in comparison with the overall trend, which was assessed to have been due to Halloween Parties.

Notable incidents over the past week include:

**Argyll & West Dunbartonshire -** Anonymous report of male breaching bail conditions at locus and also having a live apprehension warrant. Officers attended and gained entry. Male was arrested for the above offence and warrant, whilst his partner was issued with FPN for breach of COVID legislation.

**Ayrshire Division -** Disturbance reported within property. Police attend and note that there had been an argument between female householder and her friend. 2 COVID FPN issued to visitors from Paisley area and dispersed.

**Dumfries & Galloway -** One person was arrested in relation to a domestic incident. Officer note that he also appeared to have breached self-isolation legislation and was reported for Culpable and Reckless conduct. Three others present were also dispersed.

**Edinburgh City -** Loud music call. On police attendance, 7 persons found within. Enforcement action taken as the circumstances deemed it to be a clear breach of guidelines. 3 householders issued FPN.

**Greater Glasgow** - Call received from University of Strathclyde security reporting a party in the Chancellors Hall Student residence. Officers attended and 38 breach of COVID FPN were issued to students.

**Lothians and Scottish Borders -** Second attendance in the same day to deal with persons within this address who do not reside there. 1 FPN issued and 1 person arrested.

**North East -** 7 persons from two separate households from the Glasgow area found within a holiday let property. All dispersed when requested.

**Renfrewshire & Inverclyde -** Noisy party reported at locus by neighbour. Householder moved in approximately 3 weeks previously and reportedly having persons within on a frequent basis. On arrival, officers found 10 persons within drinking. FPN were issued to all 10 and dispersed.

**Tayside -** 2 FPN issued to student occupiers for admitting 8 persons to a party in a flat in a level 3 area (Dundee).



## **Service Centre Demand**



Crime Volume (9 March – Present compared to Previous Year)


Crime has continued to trend at levels lower than the seasonal average, and total crime volume year to date continues to remain considerably lower (7%) than last year.




Absences throughout the entire week has continued to trend above levels when compared to 2019.



## **Attended 'House Gatherings' Breaching Restrictions**










All Crime Groups show a decrease in volume when the preceding weeks volume is compared to the same period in 2019 with the exception of Group 5 crimes.







## Near Miss and Testing Data (w/e 23rd March – 9th November 2020)



'Near miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons. i.e. when officers are potentially exposed to: COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19.


This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE. This number of 'Near Miss' weekly submissions has remained the same as the previous week.

The amount of forms submitted continues to be attributable to the process for requesting an asymptomatic COVID-19 screening test due to an occupational risk, requiring the submission of a 'near miss' form. Many of the reports would not have been submitted without this requirement. The number of incidents where a lack of PPE is identified has not risen.

## **Custody Volume**

The below line graph displays the total custody volume over time. The number of custodies fell on the approach to 'lockdown', reaching their lowest level on 29<sup>th</sup> March. Since that date Custodies have steadily increased and now show a consistent pattern.
