5. Main Report

5.1 CURRENT LANDSCAPE

Over the last week, Police Scotland have continued their support of communities throughout the country as we negotiate through the dynamic pandemic landscape and new national restrictions which were introduced on 23rd September 2020.

Police Scotland's approach has remained unchanged throughout the pandemic period, promoting 'Engage, Explain and Encourage' prior to 'Enforcement' action being taken and this remains the correct course of action where appropriate. Notwithstanding, officers have been informed that they may take enforcement action at their discretion, by taking into account whether persons are engaging in a blatant, conscious breach of regulations, if repeat locations or individuals are involved and whether an absence of enforcement would damage public confidence in policing.

Throughout Scotland, Coronavirus cases are increasing, particularly across the central belt. A number of occurrences have affected police officers and staff. These outbreaks are beginning to impact on frontline policing delivery, however these are being monitored closely and where appropriate plans are in place to move resources to meet demand. Police Scotland have established an Outbreak Management Team (OMT) to carry out an internal 'track and trace' function and offer advice to police officers and staff and they continue to engage with divisions to assist in limiting any spread of coronavirus within Police Scotland.

Due to the increase in cases throughout the country, Phase 3 of the Scottish Government's route map through and out of the pandemic, has been paused, and the First Minister announced further restrictions on 7th October 2020 which came into effect on 9th October 2020. These restrictions cover the hospitality industry, with associated guidance being issued on travel between Health Authority areas.

Police Scotland anticipate that these new restrictions will bring a further period of adjustment for the communities of Scotland and acknowledge the sacrifices already made by individuals in order to comply with legislation and guidance. It is imperative; however, that the communities are encouraged to continue to support the restrictions and avoid complacency. Therefore, officers are guided to maintain the 4Es approach whilst being mindful of flagrant and blatant breaches of legislation, which may require a more robust approach in line with public expectation.

There is an expectation that in the coming days Scottish Government will announce a similar tiered system to that which came into force in England & Wales which could see more localised restrictions placed on areas based upon prevailing infection rates.

5.2 SERVICE CENTRE DEMAND

In the last week, the volume of 101 calls answered is 12% lower than the previous week and the volume of 999 calls is higher, having increased 3%. 101 calls answered are still

trending at lower figures than the same time last year at approximately -24%. 999 calls are also showing lower levels to the same period as last year at approximately -2%.

5.3 INCIDENT DEMAND

Total incident volumes have decreased by 4% since last week, there has been a 13% decrease on incident volumes when compared to the same dates in 2019. Public nuisance has increased by 12% on last week's figures and noise incidents decreased by 2% on last week's figures. Disturbance incidents have decreased on last week's figures by 5%. Public nuisance and noise calls remain at higher levels than last year and disturbance calls are showing at slightly lower levels than those of last year.

5.4 CRIME

Crime volume continues to remain lower than seasonal average. Overall crime in the last week is at a lower level than a comparable period last year. All divisions have experienced crime volumes of a lower level than the same period last year. Edinburgh continues to see crimes at a reduced level (52% reduction) when compared to a similar period last year.

Cumulatively all divisions are recording less crime for this year when compared with last year. All crime types other than Group 5 a crimes are also lower when compared to last year.

5.5 COVID-19 INTERVENTION ACTIVITY

Throughout the last week, Police Scotland's approach to the use of COVID-19 legislation remains to firstly engage with people, explain the provisions and encourage them to comply with the necessary restrictions with enforcement action being taken where there are found to be flagrant and blatant breaches of legislation.

In the last seven days, Police Scotland officers attended 16,544 incidents. This figure is a 5% decrease from last week.

There were 1383 COVID-19 intervention powers recorded on the CVI system this week, 66% of which took place within private dwellings.

Since quarantine regulations came into force on travellers entering Scotland from outwith the UK on the 15th June up to and including 11th October, Police Scotland have received 241 referrals from Public Health Scotland (PHS) relating to potential breaches of quarantine, 121 of which were dealt with by the resolution team and 120 of which have been dealt with by local policing. In 66% of resolved referrals, the travellers were found to be complying with quarantine restrictions. In the majority of the remaining referrals, the travellers have been untraced due to a variety of reasons such as inaccurate data provided to PHS or the expiration of the quarantine period prior to persons being traced.

There has been five FPNs issued in relation to breaches of Travel Regulations generated from Home Office or Public Health Scotland referrals. This is an increase of 1 FPN from last week relating to a person in Argyll & Bute failing to isolate following international travel.

5.6 ABSENCE

Over the past week, employee absence levels have continued to increase. This rise is partly attributable to a number of confirmed COVID-19 cases being identified which has resulted in several groups of officers being required to self-isolate as well as a rise in tracing figures. Those absences related to COVID-19 have increased from last week and are currently sitting at 460, compared to 334 last week.

5.7 OFFICER AND STAFF COVID-19 SCREENING

People & Development continue to support our workforce, providing reassurance to officers and staff who are symptomatic, to assist with returning officers and staff to work as soon as possible. Symptomatic testing arranged up to the 14th October 2020 now totals 1411. The number of tests organised by Police Scotland sits at over 3000.

From all testing, 380 have returned as positive for COVID-19.

Testing of asymptomatic officers and staff based on risk commenced on 14th May and 500 tests have been arranged up to and including 1th October 2020. Five of these tests have returned a positive result.

Contact tracing numbers are not available for this period.

5.8 COVID-19 NEAR MISSES

'Near-miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons e.g. when officers are potentially exposed to COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19. This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE.

The most current 'near miss' figures available for the dates 5th October until 12th October 2020 show that 34 forms were submitted. This is a decrease on the previous week date decrease on the week prior, where 65 forms were submitted.

5.9 GATHERINGS IN PRIVATE DWELLINGS

Scottish Government commissioned data suggests that spread in and between households continues to drive much of the transmission of COVID-19 at the present time. This analysis has guided the decision to introduce national measures to stop persons visiting other households.

Police Scotland have undertaken an assessment of the demand posed by house-gatherings. The counting of house gathering methodology is designed to quantify the number of time officers have had to enter a private dwelling to investigate suspected breach of legislation or guidance, due to the increased risks of COVID transmission associated with these environments. If officers have not been assigned, or attend several hours later due to other demands and do not enter the premises, but, for example, write off the incident 'house in darkness, no noise', this will not be included as a house gathering as there is no evidence there has been one and no increased risk to officers. Information gathered is indicative and should not be considered police statistics.

Indicative figures from the week of 5th September – 11th October 2020 suggest that Police Scotland attended over 361 occurrences of house gatherings throughout the force area. This is very similar to the previous week.

Notable incidents over the past week include:

Avrshire

Officers attended report of a party at a house in Ayr. A 15 year old had 8 friends in when her mother was at work. All non-residents dispersed. An 18 year old was issued an FPN for refusing to leave the locus.

Greater Glasgow

Officers attended a noisy party in the west end of Glasgow and found a group of 14 persons within a 3rd floor flat which is student accommodation. Four householders present and warned. Nine persons dispersed, one person issued an FPN but refused to desist and was arrested.

Tayside

Officers attended a report of a gathering of persons in Arbroath. Located a small gathering of Eastern European farm workers who were confused by legislation. They were of the understanding that as they worked together they could socialise together. Advice given and persons dispersed.

Argyll and West Dunbartonshire

Officers attended a report of a large party at an address in Dumbarton. 10 persons made off on police arrival and 10 remained within. 2 FPNs issued to those of age to receive them.

Highlands and Islands

Officers attended a report of a large scale gathering at a property in Alness. Householder was hosting a family gathering of 40 persons. All persons warned and dispersed. Householder issued an FPN for breach of COVID legislation.




The volume of both 101 and 999 calls answered showed relatively consistent levels for the reporting week.

House Gatherings in Private Dwellings



Crime Volume (9 March – Present compared to Previous Year)



Absences throughout the entire week has trended above levels when compared to 2019.







Weekly Service Centre Demand (8th October – 14th October 2020)






Cumulative Service Centre Demand (19th March – 14th October 2020)

Weekly Incident Demand 8th October – 14th October 2020)









Incident Demand – House Gatherings (31st August – 11th October 2020)

Attended 'House Gatherings' Breaching Restrictions









Weekly Crime Demand (5th October – 11th October 2020)










'Enforcement' of Coronavirus specific legislation

The following is a summary of all 'enforcement' action in relation to both The Health Protection (Coronavirus) (Restrictions) (Scotland) Regulations 2020 and Coronavirus Act 2020.

This includes all Fixed Penalty Notices issued and processed by Police Scotland. It also includes all occasions that a charge was libelled and recorded on Police Scotland's Crime Recording System against a person in relation to the aforementioned legislation. This is a true value of the volume of recorded 'enforcement' activity, but does not provide the granularity of the Coronavirus Intervention (CVI) recording system and does not capture the earlier phases of the '4 E's' approach.


Volume of Covid-19 Charges by Date

Weekly Absence (8th October – 14th October 2020)



Near Miss and Testing Data (w/e 23rd March – 12th October 2020)




'Near miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons. i.e. when officers are potentially exposed to: COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19.

This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE. This number of 'Near Miss' weekly submissions has decreased from the previous week.

The amount of forms submitted continues to be attributable to the process for requesting an asymptomatic COVID-19 screening test due to an occupational risk, requiring the submission of a 'near miss' form. Many of the reports would not have been submitted without this requirement. The number of incidents where a lack of PPE is identified has not risen.

*Work has been undertaken resulting in some duplication of results being corrected which has resulted in a drop, particularly with regards to self referral reporting data, of positive and some negative cases.

*Please note that individuals who are 'traced' are not always deemed suitable for testing and suitability is determined by the NHS. These tests are not arranged by Police Scotland. For those who have been tested within Phase 3, we have recorded the result accordingly.

*Please note Testing Data is now being reported weekly. The last Testing data report was received on 14th October 2020 and includes tests arranged up to and including 17th October 2020.



Custody Volume

The below line graph displays the total custody volume over time. The number of custodies fell on the approach to 'lockdown', reaching their lowest level on 29th March. Since that date Custodies have steadily increased and now show a consistent pattern.
