5. Main Report

5.1 CURRENT LANDSCAPE

Over the last week, Police Scotland have continued their support of communities throughout the country as we negotiate through the dynamic pandemic landscape. Police Scotland have worked with partners and communities to provide additional support and reassurance to those areas in the West of Scotland with enhanced local restrictions.

Police Scotland's approach has remained unchanged throughout the pandemic period, promoting 'Engage, Explain and Encourage' prior to 'Enforcement' action being taken and this remains the correct course of action where appropriate. However, officers have been informed that they may take enforcement action at their discretion, by taking into account whether persons are engaging in a blatant, conscious breach of regulations, if repeat locations or individuals are involved and whether an absence of enforcement would damage public confidence in policing.

In a number of areas across Scotland, clusters of Coronavirus continue to emerge. A small number of occurrences have affected police officers and staff, however at this time these outbreaks are not having a significant impact on frontline policing.

Scientific data used by the Scottish Government continues to suggest that COVID-19 transmission is significantly driven by gatherings in an indoor setting. Legislation has been in place since Friday 28th August which gives officers the power to force entry into gatherings in private dwellings and take action when the number of attendees exceeds 15.

On 14th September legislation was issued by the Scottish Government that no more than six persons, from a maximum of 2 separate households (excluding children under 12), may meet indoors, outdoors or within the hospitality industry.

On the 23rd September, the First Minister announced country-wide legislation in an attempt to stem the growing levels of infection which prevents persons visiting other households, as well as encouraging a return to working from home as a default position where possible. The legislation for this action will be introduced on 25th September. The Scottish Government have also advised an indefinite pause to further relaxations of restrictions which would have been part of Phase 3 changes of the route through and out of lockdown.

Throughout the month of September, universities across Scotland have been welcoming undergraduate students to commence their studies. The migration of undergraduates to the university cities and towns has had an impact on policing. Police Scotland have been working closely with universities to ensure that undergraduates are fully conversant and cooperative with current health protection legislation.

Indicative figures from the week of $14^{th} - 20^{th}$ September suggested that Police Scotland attended over 564 occurrences of house parties throughout the force area. These significant numbers may indicate that parts of our communities may no longer have the ability or willingness to follow regulations limiting persons within private areas. Increasing behaviours which disregard the public health of Scotland is resulting in more enforcement activity under both COVID-19 legislation and common law Culpable and Reckless conduct

being utilised where it is clear that non-cooperation is a conscious and potentially dangerous act. It is acknowledged that this may appear a more robust approach than has been encouraged across the force throughout the pandemic period, however keeping the people of Scotland safe continues to be Police Scotland's overarching priority and our response must evolve to ensure that the few who choose to place our communities in danger are dealt with appropriately.

5.2 SERVICE CENTRE DEMAND

In the last week, the volume of 101 calls answered is 11% higher than the previous week and the volume of 999 calls is similar, with an increase of 1% noted. 101 calls answered are still trending at significantly lower figures than the same time last year, approximately -16%. 999 calls are showing similar levels to the same period as last year.

5.3 INCIDENT DEMAND

Total incident volumes have increased by 5% since last week, but there has been an 8% decrease on incident volumes when compared to the same dates in 2019. Public nuisance has increased by 26% on last week's figures and noise incidents increased by 4% on last week's figures. Disturbance incidents have increased on last week's figures by 5%. Public nuisance and noise calls remain at higher levels than last year and disturbance calls have also begun to trend at slightly higher levels than those of last year.

5.4 CRIME

Crime volume continues to remain lower than seasonal average. Overall crime in the last week is at a lower level than a comparable period last year. All divisions have experienced crime volumes of a lower level than the same period last year with the exception of Forth Valley who have seen a very slight increase. Edinburgh continues to see crimes at a reduced level (46% reduction) when compared to a similar period last year.

Cumulatively all divisions are recording less crime for this year when compared with last year. All crime types other than Group 5 are also lower when compared to last year.

5.5 COVID-19 INTERVENTION ACTIVITY

During the last week, the government guidance remained in 'Phase 3' of easing lockdown restrictions until 25th September when newly announced country-wide action came into effect. The only exception to this has been the guidance in the Greater Glasgow, Renfrewshire and Lanarkshire areas. Throughout the last week Police Scotland's approach to the use of COVID-19 legislation continues to be to firstly engage with people, explain the provisions and encourage them to comply with the necessary restrictions with enforcement action being taken where there are found to be flagrant and blatant breaches of legislation.

In the last seven days, Police Scotland officers attended 18592 incidents. This figure is a 4% increase from last week.

There were 3450 COVID-19 intervention powers recorded on the CVI system this week. The majority of the incidents where intervention activity was required have been within Private Dwellings, however due to the good weather over the weekend there were a small number of incidents outside which saw large groups dispersed.

Since quarantine regulations came into force on travellers entering Scotland from outwith the UK on the 15th June up to and including 20th September, Police Scotland have received 181 referrals from Public Health Scotland (PHS) relating to potential breaches of quarantine, 86 of which were dealt with by the resolution team and 95 of which have been dealt with by local policing. In 66% of resolved referrals, the travellers were found to be complying with quarantine restrictions. In the majority of the remaining referrals, the travellers have been untraced due to a variety of reasons such as inaccurate data provided to PHS or the expiration of the quarantine period prior to persons being traced.

There have been two FPN issued in relation to breaches of Travel Regulations generated from Home Office or Public Health Scotland referrals. These have been mentioned in previous reports.

5.6 ABSENCE

Over the past week, employee absence levels have been increasing and, from the 12th September, have been above last year's figures. This rise is partly attributable to a number of confirmed Covid cases being identified which has resulted in several groups of officers being required to self-isolate as well as a rise in tracing figures. Those absences related to COVID-19 have decreased from last week and are currently sitting at 244, compared to 309 last week.

5.7 OFFICER AND STAFF COVID-19 SCREENING

People & Development continue to support our workforce, providing reassurance to officers and staff who are symptomatic, to assist with returning officers and staff to work as soon as possible. Symptomatic testing arranged up to the 23rd September now numbers 1391. The total number of tests organised by Police Scotland sits at over 2700.

From all testing, 260 have returned as positive for COVID-19.

Testing of asymptomatic officers and staff based on risk commenced on 14th May and 412 tests have been arranged up to and including 23rd September. Three of these tests have returned a positive result.

Contact tracing numbers are now being reported and this currently stands at 159, with 11 positive tests.

Police Scotland continues to be engaged in discussions about the opportunities to introduce workplace antibody testing should a valid test become available in Scotland.

5.8 COVID-19 NEAR MISSES

'Near-miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons i.e. when officers are potentially exposed to COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19. This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE.

The most current 'near miss' figures available for the dates $15^{th} - 21^{st}$ September show that 47 forms were submitted. This is a decrease on the week prior, dated $8^{th} - 14^{th}$ September, where 86 forms were submitted.

5.9 GATHERINGS IN PRIVATE DWELLINGS

Scottish Government commissioned data suggests that spread in and between households continues to drive much of the transmission of COVID-19 at the present time. This analysis has guided decisions to introduce national measures to stop persons visiting other households.

Police Scotland have undertaken an assessment of the demand posed by house-gatherings. The counting of house parties methodology is designed to quantify the number of time officers have had to enter a private dwelling to investigate suspected breach of legislation or guidance, due to the increased risks of COVID transmission associated with these environments. If officers have not been assigned, or attend several hours later due to other demands and do not enter the premises, but for example write off the incident 'house in darkness, no noise' this will not be included as a house party as there is no evidence there has been one and no increased risk to officers. Information gathered is indicative and should not be considered police statistics.

Over the week of 14th – 20th September, it was identified that 564 house parties were attended by the police. This is a decrease from 623 the previous week. The amount of gatherings from this period continued to place a significant demand on police resources. Over the same dates there were 1412 interventions recorded on the CVI systems as taking place in a private dwelling or private property. This accounts for 37% of people who have required intervention activity during this time. Since the implementation of power of entry legislation on 28th August, this power has been used at least twice.

Notable incidents over the past week include:

Aberdeen – Friday night into Saturday (19th-20th) 270 undergraduate students having an ongoing party in Hillhead Halls of Residence, Security were struggling to disperse groups, the police attended and dispersed the groups. A second party at Hillhead halls of residence occurred on the evening of 20th. 60 undergraduates were dispersed by police. There is now a confirmed COVID outbreak in this halls of residence.

Edinburgh – 21 FPN issued at a house party due to 'blatant' breach by Force Reserve Unit officers who attended to support divisional resources.

Lanarkshire - Police attended following report of ongoing house party/loud music. Large number of persons within, ongoing loud party, officers refused entry to locus. Entry was forced and party dispersed. 4 FPN issued.

There is also an emerging trend of Air B'n'B properties being used as 'pop-up' party venues. There is a clear level of planning ahead of these clear and flagrant efforts to host illegal events.

5.10 SUBMISSION

This report is submitted to the SPA for information and consideration.





House Gatherings in Private Dwellings



Crime Volume (9 March – Present compared to Previous Year)



Absences had generally trended lower when compared to 2019. However there has been a recent increase in absences which are now showing at slightly higher levels to 2019.





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

Weekly Service Centre Demand (17th – 23rd September 2020)



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


Cumulative Service Centre Demand (19th March – 23rd September 2020)






Weekly Incident Demand (17th – 23rd September 2020)





Weekly Crime Demand (14th September – 20th September 2020)









Cumulative Crime Demand (9th March – 20th September 2020)









This system allowed Police Scotland to begin gathering data in relation to the public co-operation levels with the new legislation. Due to the manual input required to form this data set, the contents of this slide are indicative only. Actual figures will differ from those recorded on Crime Systems (please see slide 11), may be subject to change, and cannot be considered Official Police Statistics. They do provide an indication of the public co-operation levels across Scotland.

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


'Enforcement' of Coronavirus specific legislation

The following is a summary of all 'enforcement' action in relation to both The Health Protection (Coronavirus) (Restrictions) (Scotland) Regulations 2020 and Coronavirus Act 2020.

This includes all Fixed Penalty Notices issued and processed by Police Scotland. It also includes all occasions that a charge was libelled and recorded on Police Scotland's Crime Recording System against a person in relation to the aforementioned legislation. This is a true value of the volume of recorded 'enforcement' activity, but does not provide the granularity of the Coronavirus Intervention (CVI) recording system and does not capture the earlier phases of the '4 E's' approach.


These values remain subject to change as offences are retrospectively added or amended and do not match the indicative 'enforcement' values from the CVI recording system.




'Near miss' forms in the context of the pandemic situation may be submitted for a variety of reasons. i.e. when officers are potentially exposed to: COVID-19 whilst not wearing PPE, where PPE malfunctions, or in any other instance an officer feels a risk to themselves in a specific occurrence relating to COVID-19.

This can occur due to the reactive nature of policing, as well as being influenced by training levels and supply of PPE. This number of 'Near Miss' weekly submissions has decreased from the previous week.

The amount of forms submitted continues to be attributable to the process for requesting an asymptomatic COVID-19 screening test due to an occupational risk, requiring the submission of a 'near miss' form. Many of the reports would not have been submitted without this requirement. The number of incidents where a lack of PPE is identified has not risen.

Custody Volume

The below line graph displays the total custody volume over time. The number of custodies fell on the approach to 'lockdown', reaching their lowest level on 29th March. Since that date Custodies have steadily increased and now show a consistent pattern.
